ALANDSFLICKAN

This short polks variant is from the Aland Islands in the northern Baltic Sea. Although territorially a part of Finland, this archipelago has been inhabited by Swedes since time immemorial. In 1954 Aland was granted the right to its own flag, for use on the islands only. Like the flag of Sweden, it is light blue with a yellow cross, but with a thin red cross superimposed.
