A COUNTRY DANCE: THE FEMALE SAYLOR

Formation: A progressive longways dance for four or more couples. The figures are performed by sets of two couples (marked #1 and #2) dancing together.

Step: WALKING STEP, beginning on the right foot, with two steps to each measure of music.

Directions

After Honors to Partner,

FIGURE I: LEAD THROUGH and CAST.

16 steps, 8 measures, ... Section A of the music.

1. #1 couples join inside hands and walk between the couple above them and then cast back to place. (The couple at the top of the formation must lead through an imaginary couple above them.) 8 steps.

#1 couples lead through the couple below them and cast back to place. 8 steps.

FIGURE II: HALF FIGURE EIGHT and RIGHT-HAND TURN. 16 steps, 8 measures, Section A of the music.

- 1. #1 couples dance a half figure eight around #2 couples below them. (#1 lady dances between #2 couple and around #2 man. At the same time #1 man dances between #2 couple, allowing his partner to precede him in crossing, and around #2 lady.) 8 steps.
- 2. #1 couples meet in the center of the set, join right hands, and make a full turn clockwise, the man finishing on the lady's side, the lady finishing on the man's. 8 steps.

The recording is an LP Album # WS 107
The dance is found on Side 2 as Dance # 3.

FIGURE III: BACK-TO-BACK and TWO-HAND TURN.

16 steps, 8 measures, Section B of the music.

1. #1 lady walks forward toward #2 man, then passes him by the right shoulder, back-to-back with him, and walks backward to place passing by the left shoulder. #1 man and #2 lady do the same. (This movement is called "Do-Si-Do" in square dancing.) 8 steps.

2. #1 lady and #2 man do a two-hand turn clockwise. #1 man and #2 lady also do a two-hand turn clockwise. All dancers end where they began this figure. 8 steps.

FIGURE IV: BACK-TO-BACK, TWO-HAND TURN, and CAST DOWN. 16 steps, 8 measures, Section C of the music.

- 1. #1 couples do a back-to-back with each other, passing by the right shoulder. 8 steps.
- 2. #I couples do a two-hand turn halfway around to their own sides of the set, then cast down the outside one place. (Note that #2 couple must move up as #1 couple casts down so the #1 couple may step back into the line.) 8 steps.

The music is recorded eight times. "The Female Saylor" is the beginning and ending tune; "Hunt the Squirrel" is alternated with "The Female Saylor" in the interior of the dance music.
