## KOZIORAJKA (koh-zhoh BAHY-kah)

This dance for three comes from the mountainous region of Beskid in the southern part of Upper Silesia in Poland. The name of the dance derives from the word "koza," the goat. It has three melodies in three different tempos, which is characteristic of this area. The dance was learned by the Dziewanowskia in Cieszyń, Poland, from the noted Silesian folklorist, Janina Marcinkows.

Music Record: DR-7167 and RPC-713. "Tance Slaskie" (Silesian Dances), side B, band 1, (available from Ada Dziewanowska); 2/4 time.

Styling Free hands are placed on walst, fingers fud, thumb back. Starting Position: Circle of threes (one M and two W) holding hands, arms straight.
