STA TRÍA

Learned from Lefteris Drandakis, co-director and field researcher of the Lykeion ton Ellinidhon of Athens, in Athens, December 1973.

RECORD: Odeon OMCG60, Side B, Band 3 or any Sta Tria

FORMATION: Under this name, it is danced principally in Epiros by M and W, holding hands at shoulder height in a line.

BACKGROUND: Many of our favorite Balkan dances are of the three measure variety - Eleno Mome, Fatise Kolo, Pravo Horo, Hassapivervikos, these being of the regular or "mirror image" sort, and Ludo Kopano, Varys Hasapikos, and Camceto which are irregular: Sta Tría (which means "in three") is of the former, "morror image", kind.

1	1-6	Variation: From time to time, the following variation may be initated by the leader and followed by the line: Releasing handhold, turn once to the R, progressing to the R using two steps (R,L).

3	1-6	Reverse ftwk and direction of meas 2.
