Narodni was also asking for volunteers for this and that and I soon began doing more and more for the group. I started out being the Party Chair, then the Advertising Chair and now I am the Vice President. I am also currently Narodni's Federation Liaison. I've found it hard to say "no"! Taking on more and more responsibilities has helped me grow as a person and I currently have the honor and privilege to help organize "Summerfest at Narodni" a co-sponsored Federation event.

Cerritos Folk Dancers

If you ever forget how truly international international folk dancing is, attend a Cerritos Folk Dancers session. Most of the attendees are Taiwanese and the dance instructions are given in Mandarin Chinese. Don't speak Mandarin? No problem. The teachers are so talented that you can pick up the steps as they illustrate them. Fine points of styling? No problem. They are conveyed too. I don't speak Mandarin but after awhile, I felt like I could speak a little. Words that crop up often are *yee*, *er*, *san*, *shee* = 1,2,3,4 and *yoo* = right, *choo* = left and *yoo bin* = right side, *choo bin* = left side and, of course, *mahn mahn quii quii mahn* = slow slow quick quick slow. Forgive my approximate pronunciation guide but you will recognize these words after hearing them just a short while.

The class, and these are classes, not just dance sessions, has many beginners, but also more experienced dancers. The teachers concentrate on dances that can be learned rather quickly and are fun to do. You might recognize many of the dances that are taught or reviewed but you may also learn a Taiwanese dance that you've never seen before. Many of the Taiwanese dances are derived in whole or part from the indigenous Taiwanese dances and are very enjoyable and have lots of styling.

The Cerritos Folk Dancers' classes are held at the



beautiful Cerritos Senior Center at 12340 South St., Cerritos, CA every Tuesday from 6:00 to about 9:00 (turn S on Ely Ave. to enter the parking lot). Since this is a class, they don't charge each time you attend, but \$10 for the whole month of classes. The very talented main dance teacher is **Sue Chen** (also group secretary), who is ably assisted by **Wen Chiang**

(consultant and dance teacher). Everyone is welcome and everyone there is very friendly.

Sue Chen has been teaching folk dancing to the Formosa Senior Association since 2007. This year, she and some friends decided to start their own folk dance group. The grand opening party for the Cerritos Folk Dancers was May 5. They advertised in a Taiwanese newspaper and a crowd of over 60 people showed up. Many of them knew at least a few dances because in Taiwan, children learn folk dancing as part of their physical education in school.

International folk dance was introduced to Taiwan in 1957 by **Mr. Rickey Holden**. He organized dance camps for dancing and teaching dancing. The first group of students was mostly school teachers. They went back to their schools and taught folk dancing to their students. So, in Taiwan, they learn international folk dance in school; simple dances like *Mayim*, Oklahoma Mixer, Gustaf's Skoal, etc.

You might wonder how this originally came about. Well, according to Dick Oakes' teacher biographies, Rickey Holden is a well known American square dance caller and international folk dance teacher, and in 1957 and 1958, the International Recreation Association (IRA) arranged for Rickey to tour the Far East, Near East, Mediterranean, and European countries. Rickey is largely responsible for spreading recreational international folk dancing throughout Europe and Asia. He first taught recreational international folk dancing in, not all, but many, many countries in the Far East. One of which was Taiwan.

Since then, international folk dancing has blossomed in Taiwan with many dances collected from all over the world. They have also created many of their own Taiwanese folk dances. In 2007 there were celebrations to commemorate the 50th anniversary of international folk dancing in Taiwan.

Sue said that the objective of her group is to let the local Chinese, including those from Taiwan, Hong Kong, and China, enjoy international folk dance together. They also welcome people from other countries. Now they have members from Korea, Thailand and Vietnam. But most of the members in the Cerritos Folk Dancers are from Sue's homeland, Taiwan. She is happy to review, upon their requests, the old dances they learned in school. She also introduces new dances that she and Wen have learned at other groups and at camps.

VARIMEZOVI FAMILY PLAYS BULGARIAN MUSIC

On Tuesday, June 6th, the Cal Tech Folkdancers were very glad to have Bulgarian music from **Ivan Varimezov**, his wife **Tzvetanka Varimezova**, and their daughters **Tanya** and **Radka**, with one of their pupils **Brian Hogan** on drums. About eighty people came from all over and danced the night away. What fun!

The Varimezovi are Thracian, Ivan from Burgas on the seacoast, Tzvetanka from Pazardjik north of Plovdiv in the west. Since 2001 they've been living in Los Angeles and teaching at UCLA. Ivan is a *gaidar* (bagpiper); his wife and daughters sing in the middle of the dance floor, the old-fashioned way. They needed no amplification to fill the Throop Church social hall with sound.



We did what we could to let local Bulgarians know about the event. Quite a few joined us. Many folkdancers don't know the languages of the songs we dance to - I don't, myself - so it made the evening much more lively to have people singing along. I think it also helped that we did the dances that folks dance.

West Thrace has a lot of songs in 11/8 rhythm for the dances we call *Gankino* or *kopanitsa* or *krivo horo*. The Varimezovi nightingales - I mean, women - sang a medley. **John Hertz** got some lyrics from Tzvetanka. We did other dances from Thrace like *pravo trakijsko* and *trite puti*, and from Pirin (the part of Macedonia that's in Bulgaria) and the Shopluk too. I'm afraid the *shopska ruchenitsa* is so popular among us folkdancers - maybe because it's complicated - that we leapt into it when the Varimezovi played a Thracian

one. What's the difference? Well, you don't get to throw forward passes in soccer.

For me the great thing about what I call "whole grain" dances is that anybody can just jump in. Some people in the line may be doing plain steps, some fancy steps, and it all goes together. As the president of a dance club I want to welcome both beginners and the more experienced. **John Filcich** says folkdancing started that way decades ago.

John brought tables of books and recorded music, including CDs by the Varimezovi. The music is beautiful, it's worth hearing at home, and you can get better acquainted with it. If you didn't grow up in a Bulgarian village you can learn from books and records. Also most of us dance to recorded music most of the time.

Halfway through we took a break and Tzvetanka, Tanya, and Radka sang *a capella*. The songs for working or sitting at dinner, not dancing, were fun too. What voices they all had!

Our next big event will be September 1st, with the **Yeseta Brothers** playing *tamburitza* music. We dance every Tuesday night at Throop Unitarian Church, corner of Del Mar and Los Robles, Pasadena.

So if you're feeling a little adventurous, motor over to Cerritos, maybe partake at one of the many fine Asian restaurants in the area, and join the Cerritos Folk Dancers for an enjoyable evening. If you do, you will want to learn this Mandarin Chinese phrase; *shaa shaa* = thank you and probably also, *sii chen* = see you again.

The above article was submitted by Nikolai Louie. Here is some background on his connection with the group.

I can give you a bit of background about my connection with the group. A friend of mine, **Nancy Atwood**, met Sue Chen at the latest Hess Kramer. Nancy asked Sue and Wen Chiang to teach some Taiwanese folk dances at Veselo (in English). Nancy told me about this and I enjoyed learning the dances. Later Nancy told me that Sue's group had recently moved to Cerritos and had become the Cerritos Folkdancers, and she asked if I would like to attend one of their sessions. Since I had enjoyed the previous teaching, I went the following Tuesday. I think the article I sent you shows how delightful I found it, especially the teaching in Chinese. Believe me there was no language barrier in learning the dances. When you consider the overall cheerful friendliness of the group, it's no wonder that I went back the following week with my camera. I wrote the article in the expectation that other folkdancers would enjoy the experience.

And some more about the group from Sue Chen:

In the Los Angeles area, there are more than ten associations doing international folk dance with dance instruction in Mandarin. Most of the dancers are from Taiwan. We are a new group, Cerritos Folk Dancers (CFD), established in Cerritos on May 5, 2009.

Everyone is welcome to join us. We have dancers from different nationalities, including American, Thai and Korean. But, most of the members in Cerritos Folk Dancers are from my homeland, Taiwan. I feel happy to review, upon their requests, the old dances they learned in school. Meanwhile, I also introduce the international folk dances that are popular among local Chinese folk dance groups. Wen and I also introduce the dances we learned in some folk dance camps.

Cerritos Folk Dancers has about 36 members now. Christine Wang is the President. Wen Chiang is our Consultant and Instructor. I am the Secretary and Chief

Instructor, besides I had been the teacher since 2007 in another folk dance class ancillary to "Formosa Senior Association." The time for that class is 5:30 to 6:30 P.M. every Thursday. The schedule for CFD is 6:00 to 8:45. every Tuesday. Both classes are held in Cerritos Senior Center at 12340 South Street, Cerritos.

POST CARD FROM CHINA

When first planning next year's Dance on the Water trip to China, I thought that it would be a good event. But having experienced it all, I am sure it will be an outstanding trip, a delight every day. Esther and I just returned from our "check out" trip. We experienced next year's whole trip as well as meeting with dance teachers and leaders in several communities, and we are already planning many joint events.

China is an exciting place to visit. China has been expending as much energy for next year's EXPO as they did for the Olympics. They have created large public parks with ponds, bridges, rock gardens and trails. Shanghai is an exciting, vibrant city while at the same time featuring and celebrating its heritage. Who would expect an attractive, lively "China Town" in Shanghai, China? What's more--to visit a four acre, four hundred year old garden within its boundaries made it hard to limit the amount of photographs we took of all the ponds, paths, buildings and rock formations. We were amazed at all the new trees we saw and then were told that the Chinese are replacing more trees than are lost in the world's rain forests. The Bund, the famous and beautiful waterfront area, is under renovation in preparation for the EXPO.

On our ship, the Victoria Prince, all cabins have a balcony with a sliding glass patio door. Each cabin has a TV (cable reception and nightly films), telephone and attractive furniture. Each bathroom has a bath tub with a shower over the tub (except for the suites that have a very large bathroom with a separate large glass-enclosed shower).

The food was delicious, beautifully presented and plentiful; the service could not be matched. At full capacity, there are two passengers for every one staff member. Besides the management and staff's excitement about hosting our dance group, there are innumerable adequate places to dance on board.

China Trip

All sightseeing and shore excursions are prepaid (including admission fees); there are no optional tours or shore excursions sold. Noteworthy shore excursions included a day long visit to the Yellow Mountain, Huang Shan, which included an 11,000 foot long, 3,600 foot ascent to the top of the mountain by cable car, where we were treated to a lovely lunch in the mountain top hotel. The spectacular views of this mountain scenery struck us as a combination of Yosemite and the Grand

Canyon. This was followed by the incomparable vistas of the Three Gorges Dam and the Lesser Gorges. Other noteworthy excursions were a performance of the talented Chinese Acrobats show, a Chinese cultural Tang Dynasty dinner show and a full morning visit to the Temple of Heaven where we observed and interacted with local people enjoying themselves (games, dancing, karaoke, poetry in that lovely setting which we hated to leave). Of course the Terra Cotta Warriors and the Great Wall were highlights of the trip.

The talented Canadian dance teacher, Sandy Starkman, will lead dancing next June and she probably will be teaching, among other things, some Chinese dances. We will have many opportunities to see dance performances and to dance with locals both in parks and dance studios.

for good behavior. I was pretty sure I had the most tickets in the class and was looking forward to using them in the auction you were going to hold towards the end of the school year. And then I got the chicken pox. What a blow that was! I was crushed. But you saved the day for me by setting aside a beautiful little magnifying glass encased in leather. When I came back to class you really made me happy by presenting me with it."

"Michael, truthfully, I don't remember giving out tickets as motivation, and I certainly can't remember bringing in a bunch of prizes to be auctioned off. I guess it worked out pretty well though."

Tom Trilling, a fellow folk dancer, had been suffering from prostate cancer for several years. After it metastasized, he struggled for more than a year but finally succumbed in May, 2009. Years ago I realized that I had had two of his sons in my class - Michael in fifth grade and later, Steven in fourth. Tom often filled me in regarding their activities as they grew into manhood. We would stand on the side of the dance floor while having a talk. Once when some other friends approached us, to their astonishment, I blurted out, "He's the father of two of my children."

Soon, Steven comes to me with a hug and kisses. "Oh, Mrs. Carlson, I'm glad to see you. It's great that you could be here with us. I still remember the times you brought your violin to class and played for us." "Steve, I can't believe it's you," I exclaim. I ask, "Where is Andrew?" "He's there, holding a baby." I walk over to him and say, "Andrew, I was awfully deprived that you were never in one of my classes. I wanted to have all three of you." "Yes, well you know, I was sorry too."

It's time for everyone to file out to be seated in the back yard. It looks like 70 or more people. I'm relieved to see a microphone and two speakers. The memorial begins with Andrew, the youngest son. He lives across the street from Tom's house with his beautiful wife, Heather, and their four girls - the oldest and the youngest grandchildren. Some years ago I asked Elke, Tom's wife how an arrangement like that was working out. Her answer was short and to the point, "A long time ago I learned to keep my mouth shut and my pocketbook open."

Andrew's eulogy is moving and delineates the joyful lives they had, helped by their close proximity to his mother and father. Next comes Steven's touching tribute. He tells us how grateful he is to have had Tom's

guidance and to have had him as a role model for being a father and a husband. After Steven, we hear from Heather, Andrew's wife. She tells us at some length and with deeply felt sincerity, of the joys she experienced as Tom's and Elke's daughter-in-law and of the pleasurable convenience she felt living so close to them.

Then Catie, Andrew's ten-year-old reads her well-written story about what "Pops" meant to her. Several other grandchildren follow. Quite a few non-family members get up to pay their respects. I am grateful to learn about many sides of Tom unknown to me in all those years. Tom was an avid folk dancer, so, as president of our folkdance club, Westwood Co-op, I, too, get up to speak into the microphone and detail how much he contributed to our club. Eventually, the memorial is brought to a close with Michael's impassioned eulogy, revealing a variety of facets of Tom's life and their impact upon him. Last is a lovely vocal rendition of "Ave Maria" by Stephen's wife, Wendy.

Now, it's time to attack the sumptuous buffet in the dining room. Later I see Steve and tell him, "Michael showed me our class picture on his laptop. Do you have anything like that?" "Well, my class pictures are in albums. Let's sit over here so we can look at them." After another hug and kiss, he sits next to me and proceeds to hold my hand while we search for the class picture. There I am with my weirdly shaped eyeglasses.

I say to Steve, "I know Michael lives in New Hampshire after being in Germany for eight years. Where do you live?" "I live in Culver City." "So do I." "Where exactly do you live in Culver City, Steven?" "We live on Orville Street." "Oh, heaven sakes! That's my street." He tells me his address. It's one block away from mine. Steven promises, "When I'm out bicycling with my kids, I'll knock on your door so we can have a visit."

I am completely enthralled by the knowledge that Tom Trilling's "boys" have grown into such fine young men and have their own wives and children.

After stuffing myself inordinately and chit-chatting with many people, I hug Elke several times and tell her, "I want to keep in touch with you and the family."

In a happy and complete daze, I float out of the house to my car.



DANCING WITH TWO LEFT FEET. (47)



It's not how you dance.

It's why you dance.

Last month I wrote about dance and music's power of healing, only to find a living example of that during the last Statewide in San Diego. In talking to my long time friend **John Filcich** I found out that

Dennis Boxell, a long time folk dance teacher who brought and taught us numerous dances we enjoy almost every week, is living in a nursing home and requires oxygen 24 hours a day. He writes:
" Medical doctors have twice told me I wouldn't make it. So far I've proved them wrong. I'm sure the power of music and dance is part of it, and good friends. Besides, I haven't finished my work yet!"

What is he doing as he sits in a wheelchair in front of a computer and inhales the life sustaining O2?

He is working on the main purpose of his life, learning and sharing the beauty and power of dance, particularly Balkan folk dance. Dennis is compiling his lifetime work of collecting songs and dances of that distant region we all learned to love through its music and dances. With the aid of a computer, sound and video software, and Internet, he is converting decades of research into digital form by producing audio and video discs.

A long time ago, in November of 1962 John Filcich brought Dennis to the Kolo Festival where, to great acclaim he presented his "original five dances", now familiar to folk dancers in the whole United States. Those dances: - *Bavno Oro*, *Belo Lence (Vranjanka, aka Iz Banju Ide)*, *Ravno Oro*, *Sitno Žensko*, and *Tresenica* are still with us. They are only a tiny portion of the dances Dennis taught over his long teaching career. I am sure that every time you dance in one of the groups you will do at least one of Dennis's dances.
