The Laguna Festival brought us teachers who exceeded all expectations for skill, energy, variety and knowledge! Miroslav "Bata" Marcetic, whose feet barely touch the ground. and Steve Kotansky, who combines beautiful steps with exquisite music to make a sublime dance experience. Quoting Vice President Diane Baker, "Participating in such a communal festival offers dancers the chance to feel ecstasy! It expands our zest for life, relieves fear, calms anxiety, opens horizons. Tired feet is a small price to pay."

Another experience of ecstasy awaits folk dancers in Claremont, CA, from Friday evening, May 31, through Sunday, June 2. That's when the Folk Dance Federation of California, South hosts the Ethnic Treasures Statewide 2019, which brings another opportunity to dance joyfully to live music by the orchestra of Miamon Miller and Friends and to recorded folk dance programs.

The staff is a remarkable group of all-time favorites, Romanian teacher Mihai David, dynamic Bulgarian teacher Petur Iliev, and vibrant Israeli teacher and choreographer Israel Yakovee. With them are two young dancers. The beautiful Sevi Bajraktar brings expertise in Turkish village dances from her own region and of Turkish Roma women. Cesar Garfiaz, a gifted teacher, brings us a special workshop in Salsa Rueda Cuban dance on Sunday afternoon.

VESELO SELO

Veselo Selo opened on June 1, 1970 as a coffee house for folk dancing in Orange County. Pat Thomas and Ann Billingsley rented the house at 719 N. Anaheim St. which had been used as a ballet studio with the exercise barres and a large mirror so it was well suited for folk dancing. We had an adjoining room with tables and benches, a refrigerator and a bar for the convenience of refreshments which members brought to share. We usually had a few bottles of wine in that space which we gladly shared.

Our DJ had a small space near that eating area in which we played the LPs and 45s and we also had a lot of 78s... rpm, that is. Remember those records? Requests were played in order as requested and we had an efficient system going for us. A very large and heavy tape player was used when we had parties with all the favorites ready to go!

Renting the house made it possible to have dancing any night we chose during the week. We had special nights for various nationality music and dance with teaching on each of those special nights by a specific teacher. But Saturday was the biggest night of all, and a big plus was that since we had the house by the month, we didn't have any specific closing time. Midnight, or later, was common. Some of the master teachers we had from other countries were Ciga Dospatavich, Slobodan, Bora Ozkok, and Atanas Kolarovski. We also had great teachers who lived in our area, to name a few: Bora Gajicki, Billy Burke, Barry Glass, Tom Bozigian, Israel Yakovee, Shlomo Bachar, Mihai and Alexandru David. Most of these prominent teachers had weekly classes in the LA area.

Marge and Bora Gajicki were the second owners of Veselo Selo after buying it from Pat Thomas and Ann Billingsley. Subsequent owners were Gerry and Bill Woods, and last owner was Ken Roberts. After that, Veselo Selo became a co-op. In order to buy Veselo Selo from Ken, we had to raise the money, and this is where our membership started with 97 members! We then needed officers and our first president was Jim Ulrich, then Carol Maybrier, then Lu Perry. Then in spring 1990, the owners of the building put it up for sale. We had to move.

Veselo Selo's next home was a huge dance floor in the recreation hall at Hillcrest Park in Fullerton. We then had to go to only Saturday night dancing. Pat Thomas and Carol Maybrier shared teaching a beginner class on Friday night. We had the large mirrors, many windows, a patio and a huge dining area downstairs where we had some great potluck

dinners for New Year's Eve, our anniversary, and any other special events. We had good storage area for our equipment of speakers, and a rollout cabinet for the tapes.

Everyone loved that location. Then the city started renovating and built a beautiful patio adjoining our building which was rented out on Saturday nights during the daylight saving time months. We were moved around to various places until October when we could resume our good location. Eventually, the city wanted to work on our building so we moved to our present location in Anaheim at the corner of Harbor and Santa Ana Streets.

We had one year when we moved to the Anaheim Community Center less than a mile from our present location. We had that through the Senior Center but it was still occasionally closed to us when the city had a paying renter. We went back to the Unitarian Church where we are now dancing on most Saturdays. The location is convenient to freeways, and we have ample parking

Our special event potlucks are now only finger foods for lack of space. But we still have big anniversary and New Year's Eve parties. We had three parties in which Henrietta Bemis and Lu Perry celebrated their birthday every five years, the last being our 85/90th.

We did have a special beginner class that Carol Maybrier taught on Wednesday night at this location. Some of those people are now members of Veselo Selo. Sandy Wodicka had a special beginners' dance class on one Saturday a month last year which was very instructive to our longtime dancers. She has a wonderful way of explaining and teaching basics.

Veselo Selo is alive and well, and we'll be celebrating our 49th anniversary this year. Join us for this event. And Happy dancing to all!





COSTUME CORNER

Opanci

Serbians are famous among folk dancers for their comfortable, turned-up-toed leather shoes, called *opanci* (oh-PAHN-tsee). (*Photo 1*) But contrary to popular belief, opanci don't have to have turned-up toes, it's not just the Serbs who wear opanci, the toe-up form isn't medieval but goes back at least 3500 years in the north Mediterranean, and—I'll break all your cookies now—the singular is *opanak*. (Yup: look it up; Wikipedia even gives its Slavic etymology.)

Opanci are characterized by having a leather sole that wraps part way up and around the foot, then is fastened into that position by strips of leather woven together in some way, with yet another strap of some kind to hold it more firmly to the foot when it is put on. It is the folding up of the sole in front that can be creased into the famous curled-up toe—the virtue of which is that it protects one's own toes from getting stubbed on rocks in rough terrain.

If we keep that in mind, the distribution of toe shapes in the Balkans makes more sense. Croatia is mainly broad agricultural river plain, and the opanci seldom turn up at all. The stitches attaching the very soft, woven leather uppers to the sole run all the way around at the same height.

Some Serbian opanci, too, don't turn up very much; but those from Šumadija in particular turn not just up but back toward one's ankle, and the leather tends to be much harder, tougher: real protection against stubbing.

Macedonian and Bulgarian opanci (Bulg. *opinki*, actually) are sort of in between, with the sole being stitched together above the toes to make part of the upper, creating a small upturned point at the tip. The rest of the upper is made from a wide strap running along the top of the foot and held in place by two or three broad cross-straps, rather than being woven of many very narrow strips.

Romanians, Bosnians, Albanians, and others each have their own variations (and names) for these highly utilitarian homemade shoes—which of course largely dropped out of use during the 20th century. Who needs them, other than folk dancers, when we not only have cheap, factory-made shoes available but spend most of our travel-time riding, not walking?

But now imagine yourself back in a world with almost no paved roads—true in most of the Balkans until during or after World War II, because few rural people had mechanized vehicles. (There were no paved roads in Greece outside of the towns, when I lived there in 1962.) Opanci were very practical for walking on dirt.

And now go yet further back, to a time when there were <u>no roads at all</u>, before much of anybody even had wheels (which required roads). If we plop our time machine down in Turkey or Greece at, say, 1400 BCE, in the Late Bronze Age, what do we find? *Everyone* is wearing opanci or boots with heavily turned-up toes. (*Photos 2-4*.) They apparently didn't like stubbing their toes either!



The decoration on the Hittite ankle probably adorns a sock or legging. The spiral up the Mycenaean ankle is apparently a strap holding the shoe on.

Photo 4: Relief from the great rockcut sanctuary at Yazilikaya, Turkey, about 1225 BCE, showing the Hittite sun-god Sharruma protecting King Tudhaliyas IV, while both (and the hieroglyph, above left) have their feet protected by elegantly upturned toes.

Dear Mr. Michtom:

First, we'd like to tell you how much we enjoy the *Scene* each month. It is great to know that there are still many folk dancers around. All of the articles are very well written, and we like to see the variety of costumes worn.

We have been folk dancers since our early teens (we are now 88). We taught all kinds of folk dancing for over 55 years. We taught adults and children in

many schools throughout Northern California. We attended the Stockton Folk Dance Camp many times, sometimes on a scholarship. We went to Edinburgh, Scotland and attended the university there for 3 months. We met the folk dance teacher whose group performed for Queen Elizabeth II during the Edinburgh Festival in August of 1961. At our invitation, the teacher came to the university to conduct dance sessions for us and our fellow students. Her group would perform wonderful Scotlish dances for us as well. It was a great opportunity for all of us.

Now, we don't know if you are interested, but we have a large collection of both records and tapes of dozens of folk dances from around the world that we would willingly send to you for your use at no cost to your group. We have not danced for a while ourselves, but would love to share the dance tapes we have with all dancers from the Folk Dance Federation of California. We have also written

directions for many of the dances.

We were fortunate to get into the folk dance craze very early after the Second World War veterans returned, having learned various folk dances while abroad, and came home to teach and share their knowledge and interest in these cultures.

We are so glad that you and your devoted group continue to offer so many dance opportunities to so many eager folk dancers. We wish you ongoing success with your programs.

SEASON YOUR WEEKEND AT STATEWIDE 2019 WITH SALSA BY CESAR

Cesar Garfiaz grew up dancing! He danced Cumbia at family celebrations, fell in love with Banda music on visits to Guadalajara, learned Salsa from his Aunt Raquel and got introduced to other genres of Mexican music and dance at family parties of friends. Nature or nurture? Social dancing and family influenced his child-hood. Cesar and his sister became a celebrated dancing kid couple in Silverlake, L.A., and Aunt Raquel got to dance while babysitting.

Enrollment in the department of World Arts and Cultures at UCLA provided a foundation for Cesar's expanding concepts and ideas about dance. There he collaborated with Ana Maria Alvarez and became a cofounding member of Contra-Tiempo, the Urban Latino Dance Theatre, of which she is the artistic director. With the company's successful trajectory into performance and touring, Cesar left academia for performance. His professional development continued with master classes and workshops—in Havana and Santiago de Cuba, Puerto Rico, Baja California, Chile, Bolivia and Ecuador. Cesar engaged with the community, attending clubs and social dance venues, and teaching at local schools and universities—wherever Contra-Tiempo held concerts and residencies. He transitioned out of the ensemble 2 years ago when touring interfered with his local teaching engagements. Cesar is currently creating content for a YouTube channel to provide instruction on line.

Cesar recounted an impressive vignette from his experience teaching 6th graders community building through dance. The youth were learning Salsa Rueda while simultaneously engaging with the concepts of being a leader and a follower, being a part of a whole, and fulfilling responsibility required by one's role. Graduation included a performance for an audience of parents, friends and families. The students felt so anxious they had to be prodded to actually go on stage. After executing the prepared program they felt so proud of their accomplishment that they danced an improvisational encore "from their hearts". Crying and laughter came next as they realized how much they had changed. Attention grabbing boys *listened*. Shy girls claimed power to quietly *guide* their partners. They had become a *community* through the process of dancing together.

Cesar believes that all people have a natural tendency to dance or move rhythmically. One senses the world around their body, gathers knowledge, by moving! Learning to use one's body confidently is an effective skill to communicate, explore, engage, receive communication and also to affect one's surroundings. Not dancing is a disservice to one's brain and to society! Well put, Cesar!

Are you curious about the origin of Salsa Rueda? Think "dance fusion"! Cesar explained that in the 18th century in Cuba, a European dance style called *contradanza* spread across the island. A group dance called *bastonero* with several couples being directed by one caller was also popular. Synthesis! Other Cuban rhythms, like son, danzon, danzonete, mambo, cha cha and rumba mixed into the culture of dance and created the casino style. The name "Rueda de Casino" derived from the fact that gambling casinos closed in 1959, and some of the venues reopened as dance halls. People referred to the dance halls as "casinos" then called the dance done in the halls "casino".

Social dance continues to evolve. In the greater L.A. community salsa encompasses many Latino cultures. Cesar feels that "after having gone through the grinder of competition style dancing and showmanship, salsa is returning to its roots of people dancing for connection and engagement rather than competition". At Statewide 2019 we are inviting salsa dancers from the nearby community to join us for the session "Salsa with

Cesar" beginning at 1:30 p.m. Who knows what fusion will occur when they join the line for a *hora* or *braul* during the request dance session that closes the weekend?

Please continue to check website socalfolkdance.org for schedule, meals and transportation in Claremont. Late breaking news! Bassist Simeon Pilich will travel to Europe for a family reunion in May. He is being ably replaced by Janie Cowan! Welcome to Statewide, Janie!! She plays with Miamon, Michael and Bill as a member of "Free Range Organic".
