

TROIKA Russian

Troika means "three horses." The dance symbolizes the three horses that traditionally drew sleighs for the Russian noble families.

Formation: Set of three, man between two ladies, facing line of direction, inside hands joined, outside hands on hip.

Step: Running step.

DIRECTIONS FOR THE DANCE

Meter 4/8

MEASURES

I. Run Forward

- 1-4 Beginning right, take sixteen running steps in line of direction. The first four runs may be done diagonally right, second four, diagonally left, and last eight straight forward.
 - II. Arch
- Right-hand lady moves under arch made by raised arms of man and left-hand lady with eight running steps. Man runs in place and follows right-hand lady turning under his left arm. Left-hand lady runs in place.

7-8 Left-hand lady moves under arch made by raised arms of man and right-hand lady with eight running steps. Man runs in place and follows left-hand lady turning under his right arm. Right-hand lady runs in place.

III. Circle

- 9-11 Set of three join hands in circle and run twelve steps clockwise.
- 12 Stamp left, right, left, hold.
- 13-16 Repeat action of measures 9-12, moving counterclockwise.

STYLE

The knees should be lifted high and the body and head held high.

MIXER

The man may move forward to the next group of three as the stamps are taken in the last figure.
