WALTZ MAZURKA (German Waltz Mazurka)

This dance, like Senftenberger, is a relatively new dance created by a German Youth Group in Berlin sometime in the early 1920's. It was presented at the 1953 Folk Dance Camp in Stockton by Gretel and Paul Dunsing.
