SILVERADO FOLK DANCE CLUB

The Silverado Folk Dance Club celebrated its 25th Anniversary in October 1971 with a big party. The club was established by Joe and Aileen Winters, who had enjoyed folk dancing in San Francisco before they moved to Long Beach. They organized Silverado and were its first teachers. This was the FIRST International folk dance club in the city. Among charter members still active in folk dancing are Grace Dimmick, Ruth and Mart Graeber, Edgar and Marion Wilson, Joe and Ruth Freedman, Tom Daw, and Harvard and Betty Hicks (who later established a folk dance group in Anacortes, Washington). Harvard, while living in Long Beach, was President of the Folk Dance Federation, South and of Silverado... Silverado's current president, Ruth Graeber, saw an article in the paper in 1946 announcing an exhibition of folk dancing in Silverado Park which drew her, Mart, Betty and Harvard, and some of the other aforementioned charter members into the folk dance movement.

In past years, the Silverado exhibition group, under the direction of Petra Wright, performed at the Fishermen's Fiesta and at various Statewide Festivals. The Silverado Club held its first Federation Festival in August of 1949, and also hosted the 1954 Statewide Festival. They co-hosted the Long Beach "Statewides" in 1960 and 1967. Among early members still actively dancing are Dorothy Daw, Eleanor Gilchrist, Frank Almeida, Don Knight, Oliver Seely, Pauline Edmonds, John and Betty Simpson, Harmon Mayo, John West, Ralph and Sylvia Surlage, Bali and Bee Iorio, Joe and Mary Avery, Gus Krupka, and Lydia Seitz. Truly a club with a long list of steadfast members.

AMAN INSTITUTE '72

This, Aman's 3rd Annual Balkan Dance Institute, was an exciting $2\frac{1}{2}$ days (altho by Sunday nite, it felt like $12\frac{1}{2}$ days) where it seemed most of the various problems of the previous two years had been worked out --- there was enough room (or almost) at the Croatian Hall; plenty of free parking; a spirit of helpfulness on the part of Aman members, noticeable not only toward their guests but toward each other; and the material offered was, without exception, excellent and suitable for any folk dance group of whatever age and ability. ("High Life" promises to sweep the board from senior citizen to the youngest "Opanki Dancer".) Unfortunately, Federation people were conspicuous by their scarceness.

The music provided by the Aman Orchestra, recorded and live, was of the best, and extras such as Phil Harlan's lecture-demonstration of African drumming, the cultural, ethnic, geographic, and musical information given for each section, special dance exhibitions, and especially the singing sessions, were all large plusses.

The meals were tasty (Barry Glass' chicken - out of this world!), altho that good spaghetti for lunch just before a <u>five hour</u> workout may have lacked merit for many. Questionable also was the appropriateness of the wine-and-beer bar being open all day, as well as evening, even though it was for the scholarship fund!

We'd like to drop two items into the suggestion box: (1) in a hall as large as Croatian Hall, and with that many people, high ceilings, etc., the teacher should have a chest "mike"; and (2) how about having, in 3 or 4 months (before camptime), a review session open only to those who attended the Institute so the material - line, couple, two-women-and-a-man dances - will remain viable. You might call it "Aman 32".

Sure helps a great deal when "Scenetime" rolls 'round to have them all ready to stuff the envelopes we mean, not the committee!

Thanks also to those lovely people who have sent in subscriptions for other people, either as gifts, or as "salesmen" for "Scene". Among them were three sent by Ruth Silver, and another one from Millie Libaw.

Still more thanks - these to those people who keep track and renew ahead of time - it really helps with our records, and does save postage. You know who you all are, and we thank you muchly.

It was suggested that a clarification be made in this column regarding flyer fees and ads once more. Okay. here goes. Flyers concerning Federation events such as Federation camps, monthly festivals, institutes, fund-raisers, etc. - no charge. (After all, a fee would be merely taking it out of one pocket and putting it in the other.) ... For activities by Member Clubs of the Federation - such as parties, local festivals, institutes, programs, etc. - there is a minimal fee (at present, \$1) which does not cover the pro-rata share of the postage. Non-Federation, nonprofit flyers are in the next scale up, and are variable. Some concerts and scholarship fund-raising "semi-pro" events fall in about here, too. Beyond that, flyers become the equivalent of full-page ads, and are so counted (though you get credit for the amount it would cost us to have them printed if you supply your own). These are considered commercial and, frankly, we rather discourage them. Not only does it mean additional work for us in collating (selfish?). but also we think you, as an advertiser, get more

impact from a \$\frac{1}{4}\$ or \$\frac{1}{2}\$ page display ad snuggled right among the text than you do from a flyer. In fact we're sure of it, for we have gotten favorable comments, both via phone and in person, about Zorba's "Cicero" and Bora and Marge's shop. "Scene" started out with altruistic ideas about no advertising, but events proved this was not to be. We still stick to the idea that ads should have something to do with folk dance or folklore - we don't want to sell the Colonel's chickens or cemetery lots yet! Sometimes a point will be stretched - in the next issue you'll find a flyer on Sacramento's "Mansion Inn" included, but they are Statewide Headquarters, are essentially a part of the event, and are cooperating with the Federation fully... As for rates - one full page is \$20; \frac{1}{2}\$ page, \$10; \frac{1}{4}\$ page, \$5; or one column inch is \$1. Actual size, camera-ready copy, please, black on white, inasmuch as we can only reproduce by photo offset. Clearer now? If any questions remain, write or call in the evening and we'll try to answer them.

areas of Bukovina.)... Next to her, wearing a costume dating from the early part of this century, is a shepherd from the same general area - there is black and red embroidery on the collar and front of the full sleeved shirt, plus a little trim on the shirt bottom and sleeve cuffs; a wool jacket in shades of brown, horizontally striped, hangs over one shoulder (our "dandy" has evidently thrown the other shoulder off to display his shirt front!); and he is wearing the usual Moldavian moccasins, of course... Bottom left is another North Moldavian costume, dating from somewhere in the mid-1920's. This one is crisply white, well-embroidered in shades of reds and oranges, black-accented, on the shirt, as well as on the full length, sleeveless fur-trimmed coat... Opposite him is a girl from Central Moldavia, somewhat east of Kishenev, wearing a full blouse in a pastel color with a little embroidery, a necklace of very large black beads, and a very full skirt, predominately red, but with greens and blues as accent colors. This, we understand, dates from the period of the middle or late 1920's.

ON THE AIR

KFAC continues to give mention of our festivals over its cultural calendar each month. However nobody ever knows just when or how often. Perle, the hard working publicity director for the Federation, would like to know about these things, and we'd sure appreciate it if anyone hearing news of Federation activities over KFAC (or any other station, KHJ especially) would jot it down and pass the info along. Perle Bleadon is at 8720 W. Olympic Blvd. in Los Angeles. By the way, there were rumors there'd be an article concerning folk dancing and/or the Federation in the January issue of KFAC's monthly "Classics West" magazine. And we did get a couple of phone calls asking about the festival mentioned in that magazine. Anybody see it out there??? We'd like to know about that, too!

KPFK-FM, that supporter of international folk dancing, is having a special March schedule. The "Old Ethnic", Mario, will be on the air, but pitching for "tax deductable funds" to keep the listener-supported station on the air. Hark in and see if you can't give your support. He has just completed a two hour interview with Trudi Schoop, a pioneer in modern dance. This dynamic woman, at her peak in the '30's and '40's, has recently become a folk dance fan. Listen for this interview sometime in April or May (that is, if you can help the station raise its \$150,000)... Mario has been giving us plenty of music from the Aman records, and we've heard some interesting records on the S & R label (?), which is apparently an educational series, from the Children's Music Center out on West Pico, also one of the good friends of the Federation.

VALLEY FOLK DANCERS FESTIVAL

Come Saturday, March 25, Spring will be busting out all over at the "Spring Fling Festival" staged by the Valley Folk Dancers at Los Angeles Valley College in Van Nuys.

The "Spring Fling" will mark the second consecutive annual Folk Dance Federation Festival of the Valley Folk Dancers (although they had held a festival or two way back in the dark ages of the early '50's!). Again, it will be held in the men's gym - Ethel Ave. and Burbank Blvd. Ransom and Betty Vess, co-presidents of the club, have announced that there will be kolos from 7:30 to 8 p.m., followed by a dazzling program of the most popular folk dances from 8 to 11 p.m. (For Federation Council members, a council meeting is at 4 p.m.)

Topping it all off, there will be a "passel" of exhibition dances by one of the most color-ful groups in Southern California, the Zadruga Folk Ensemble. 20 dancers and 7 "live" musicians, dancing in full costume, will present dances of Serbia and Slovenia, directed by Jack Kinneer. Special music for the half-time show has been prepared by Laura Rich, song director, and Adrienne Lipow, women's director, and Dr. Robert Howell who is in charge of the orchestra. This Ensemble is composed mainly of young people averaging about 20 years of age, and is becoming widely known in the Southland.

There will be no admission charge - refreshments are free - and there will be plenty of parking (arrangements have been made to use the parking lot directly across the street). Meanwhile, Ruth Oser and Sid Pierre, club instructors, are "tuning up" the Valley Folk Dancers for the big blowout. Ruth and Sid have long been identified with Southland folk dancing.

The entire Festival will be highlighted by the Spring theme, when "a young man's fancy (and that of the not-so-young, too) lightly turns to thoughts of love". And Rance and Betty Vess have issued a special invitation to the public (even those who don't folk dance) to come along and see and join in the fun.

BORINO KOLO CONCERT

The first Festival and Institute to be given by the Borino Kolo Folk Ensemble promises to be a winner with Bora Gajicki's teaching, a concert performance by the Ensemble, and a party with live music by two orchestras - the Hajduks and the Borino Orchestra. This takes place Saturday, March 11, at the beautiful facilities of Yugoslav-American Hall in San Pedro at 17th and Palos Verdes Streets.

In anticipation of the event, the Ensemble performed for San Diego's International Hour on KFMB-TV, and a showing of the taped program is scheduled for Saturday, March 4, at 11 a.m. In addition, Bora will be interviewed by Mario Casetta on KPFK and will play some of the music especially recorded for the Institute.

The opportunity to work with Bora is not to be missed - he will teach "Maskoto", a slow, controlled dance from Macedonia; "Klecka", a fast paced Serbian number; "Cuburka", typical of Central Serbia; and "Sokacko", a simple dance from Baranja. Teaching is from 2 to 5 p.m. All these dances are on one record which is available, and a syllabus will be given each registrant.

At 8 p.m., following the dinner break, there is a kolo hour, programmed by Donna Tripp; then at 9, the Ensemble presents a concert of Yugoslav Music and Dance - all in full authentic costumes. Dances include a Macedonian Suite featuring the song "Zurli Trestat Na Sred Selo" and a Croatian Suite entitled "Sokacko". The girls of the Ensemble will do "Duj, Duj" from Vranje, and there will be a Shope Suite for four men. Two duets will be danced with Bora in each - a Skiptar Wedding Dance with wife Marge, and a Gypsy Dance from the Vojvodina with Bonnie Hough. The exciting Vlasko Suite will also be presented in addition to the music and songs.

BORINO

Following the concert will be live and recorded music for dancing with the two orchestras providing most of the program. Refreshments will be available during the evening. Cost for the Institute will be \$2; for the Concert and Party together, \$2; or for the entire event, a package price of \$3.50; with proceeds to be used for costumes, music and instruments for the group. Tickets are available in advance from any member of the Ensemble, at Veselo (719 N. Anaheim Blvd. in Anaheim), or from Bora & Marge Gajicki - - send your check and a stamped, addressed return envelope to them at 2734 E. Broadway, Long Beach, CA 90803. CAMELLIA FESTIVAL

"A beautiful spectacle" is often the comment about this annual event, this year called "Scandinavian Holiday". Each year, a nation or group of nations is selected to be honored. The 1972 Festival, after months of planning, has activities and exhibitions from March 3 through March 12 which attract thousands of spectators, including folk and square dancers, flower lovers, artists, sportsmen, music lovers and ballet dancers. The Camellia Queen is selected at a breakfast on March 3, and on Saturday night at Cal Expo the regal Camellia Ball is held. March 4-5, the Camellia Show is at the Memorial Auditorium. For the 48th year, camellia growers proudly display these magnificent flowers that grow so well in Sacramento's perfect climate. Over 10,000 blooms are on display, and as you enter the Show or arrive or depart from the airport, you are given a camellia for your very own. New this year is the planting of camellia groves along the freeways of Sacramento.

Among the VIP's participating this year is the First Lady, Pat Nixon, who is to dedicate a grove of camellias named after her in Capitol Park on March 4. She will be the guest of Governor and Mrs. Reagan so as to be on hand next day to open the show... Artists have exhibitions of their works in the Morse Building; photographers display their works in Mark Twain Lobby of the Sacramento Union during the period. (March 6 and 7, 8 p.m., will have International slide showings at the Municipal Utility Auditorium.)... Each day is loaded with activities. One could start at 6 a.m. on March 11, for example, by watching the foot race starting at Cal Expo; then go downtown to see the parade; then to lunch at Sacramento Inn where Scandinavian Nations are being honored; and, finally, in the evening, see the Sacramento Civic Ballet.

You readers will probably be most interested in the Camellia Folk Festival to be held that night (Saturday) March 11, and on Sunday, March 12, during the afternoon and evening. General Chairmen Hank Shonerd and George Marks promise these two days to be outstanding as in the past. Evelyn Prewett, folk dance program chairman, has a selection of 30 dances between 8 and 11:30 p.m. - squares, naturally, between each set of 6 folk dances. An after party has been planned by John Brakebill and his committee, Camtia Dance Ensemble.

The Memorial Auditorium will be transformed into a place of beauty and color as you watch the Sunday pageant (1:30 to 3:30 p.m.). The Queen and her Court of Princesses will be seated aboard a Viking ship, and exhibition groups from all over Northern California will perform in their usual excellent way. Then the Cameron Pipe Band leads the Queen and Court down the length of the auditorium... Following this, the recreational part of the festival resumes, starting with the sounds of "To Tur"... Following a dinner break, the Sunday evening program continues until 10:30 p.m.... And so until next year!

'STATEW I DE'

By now you are all aware that the Statewide Festival of the Folk Dance Federation will be held in Sacramento this year. Of course, the big thing up there for this month is the Camellia Festival above, but a few additions re the May event to keep you posted... Your

next issue of "Scene" won't be <u>quite</u> as thick as "Playboy" (how the heck they ever manage to saddle-stitch that thing with only <u>two</u> staples is beyond us here!), but there will be some <u>six</u> flyers with all the particulars (they're sitting on our floor right this minute!), and then you'll have the entire story - registrations 'n everything. (No centerfold though. We looked around at the last Council meeting for possible candidates and decided against it.) The entire Festival (participants') dance program is listed, and it is one of the finest ever - with many new dances introduced during the last year at camps and institutes, and squares after every seventh folk dance. With some of the best square dance callers living in the San Joaquin/Sacramento Valley areas, this part alone should be worth the trip for those who fain wouldst participate more in square dancing. If you can't wait 'til next "Scene" for details, call us; or latch onto your club's Council minutes, wherein Elsa has stapled the set of flyers; or buttonhole Perle, who will have some, or Ray Garcia in San Diego who, we believe, will be receiving a batch for that area!

Meanwhile, let's go gold rushing from Sacramento for a few minutes... And if you have time, you could do likewise, for in the late Spring, the "Gold Rush Country" in the foothills to the north, to the east, or to the south of Sacramento is at its best. The grass is greening, the oaks are lovely, and there are feathery bushes of lilac, blood red Indian Paintbrush — maybe some golden poppies still in bloom — and yellow Scotchbroom everywhere — (okay, so it's pesky stuff, but pretty, isn't it, blazing on the hills?)

Take I-80 to Auburn, and on to Grass Valley or Nevada City - beautiful little towns with a profusion of original homes, oft opened annually so tourists may see their antiques - or go down State 49 to the Middle Fork of the American River (before it is forever inundated) and go to Cool Hill - slowly so as not to miss the scenery - Coloma - Lotus. You know about Coloma's history, its State Park and Museum, but do you know about the ice cream parlor and the iron doors on the buildings?

Then there is Placerville, El Dorado, Drytown, Sutter's Creek, Jackson - or even Angel's Camp (the Jumping Frog contest will be over by then!). All settled in the days of '49, they still look it. Murphy's tree lined streets and brick buildings look just as they did 125 years ago. (How many Stockton Campers remember the "in-between week-end" and the watermelon feast there?)... Though Sutter's Creek is growing every day with people leaving the cities, building retirement homes, etc., they adhere to the flavor, and construction follows generally the old themes and designs.

Or you can go to Fiddletown - once home of many Chinese, those hardy people whose picks and shovels were responsible for the building of the Central Pacific Railroad - and its museum and the ruins of the forts they built to keep off the "bandidos". Thirsty? Stop in at the D'Agostine Winery, now a historical monument... And Jackson is well known as the home of the gigantic 68-foot-high Kennedy Tailing Wheels, now falling into ruin for lack of adequate care. A historical center, but also a free-wheeling, rootin' tootin' square dance town where "everybody just loves Saturday night!"... And, if you're well on your way home south-bound now, by no means should you forget Columbia, the gem of the Sierras - a beautifully reconstructed old town, summer home of the drama department of the University of the Pacific, and lovingly tended by the State Department of Recreation and Parks!... Now we advise you to head back to Interstate 5 - pronto. The scenery would still be marvellous along the Sierras, but, oh, that traffic around Yosemite over the Memorial Day week-end!

March 6, "Rezijanka I and II" (Slovenia); March 13, "Ručenica" (Bulgaria); March 20, "Bunjevacko Momačko" and "Bačko" (Croatia); March 27, "Trite Puti" (Bulgaria). Each dance will be reviewed three successive times after its initial presentation. (Left over from February, going into March, will be "Memede" (Macedonia) and "Krivo Panagjursko" (Bulgaria). 

SEVERAL ITEMS OF SPECIAL INTEREST were on our agenda to be presented here this month. However, they are all of some magnitude and cannot be dismissed with a mere paragraph, so we'll mention them briefly and attempt to elaborate next time. While a time element is definitely involved, things aren't going to happen right away, and some factors can start operating and contacts be made... One is the proposal for the creation of a National Folk Dance Directory. This is a rather special project of Mr. LaBarbera of New York, who freely admits that a complete directory is a monumental task, probably out of the question at present. An alternate idea involves a series of regional directories prepared by such organizations as our California Federations, the New York group of classes and teachers, and other interested and dedicated individuals - all to be compiled and made interchangeable with other regions for the eventual benefit of folk dancers everywhere... Another item is in regard to the possible presentation of a regional (perhaps eventually the nationwide) conclave of the National Folk Festivals Association which has been operating for some 34 years now. Sarah Gertrude Knott, founder of the Association, has been in contact with some of us and is now investigating the possibilities further - this would be a nice feature to have in our midst. Anyhow, there is a tremen-

dous amount of information in all the material we have received from her and it certainly is deserving of much scrutiny... Our intention had been to include the instructions prepared by Elsa Miller on "Basic Costumes" in this issue, inasmuch as it is desirable that folk costumes be worn at "Statewide", and for those who have none, Elsa's material is invaluable. However, lack of space precludes it this month...

FEDERATION IN FOCUS

We had a jolly Council meeting at Laguna during which many Federation actions were either resolved or unresolved. We have a new Member Club now - the Santa Maria Folk Dancers, with Audrey Silva as its director. Also, we have the Westside Jewish Community Center club back in the fold... On your calendar, confirm the dates of May 6 for the Idyllwild Bacchanal and May 13-14 for the Ojai Festival... The Nominating Committee came up with its preliminary slate of officers for the coming election. They are: Al Dobrinsky, President; Roy Johnson, Vice-President; Marsha Wiener, Treasurer; Linda Pate, Recording Secretary; Elsa Miller, Corresponsing Secretary; Sheila Ruby, Director of Extension; Perle Bleadon, Director of Publicity; and Mildred Walter, Historian. Nominations from the floor will be made at the Valley Festival Council meeting - if you have suggestions for candidates, or are willing to run for office, contact the Committee before then, or make the nomination at the meeting.

One big item of discussion involved the means of bringing the younger element into Federation participation by including their school and collegiate clubs on an active level. Most of these student groups are operating without funds, and find it almost impossible to buy records, let alone pay the \$10 annual fee required for Federation club dues... The idea of a "sponsorship fund" took fire at the Laguna Council meeting, and Ralph Miller started a ball rolling by offering to donate \$10 for this purpose. Then generous Millie Libaw, who happened to be present, offered \$50, which really increased the pot. Vivian Woll said that her club would participate, and since then, we understand, both the Westwood Co-op and the Hollywood Peasants have indicated they would join in. Now it is up to the special committee to set the machinery in motion - and, of course, to other donors to keep the funds coming in. We need new, young, and enthusiastic groups!

We were recently asked (and have been asked before on several occasions) what machinery the Federation has to assist in the formation of new clubs or the recuperation of ailing ones. One could paraphrase a famous statement and put it, "Ask not what your Federation can do for your club, but what your club can do for your Federation" - and vice-versa. Whole reams could be written on either of these aspects with still nothing resolved, because in the one case you need the material and incentive to work with - and in the other, the desire of the club to "get well". A club rent by internal dissention has a hard row to hoe, and nothing the Federation can do, despite the ideals set forth in its Articles of Constitution, can help. On the other hand, some clubs are so well run, are so harmonious and gregarious, that they could probably give the parent organization a lesson or two. If you have ever been to a "More the Merrier" party, a "Westwood Co-op" week end, or a "Mountain Dancers" family outing (and all three are widely different in make-up), you'll know what we mean. There are many more, of course, but we singled these three out as obvious examples of success. Cooperation is the watchword for all clubs - and most assuredly, the Federation will do all possible to help you out:

In this "Scene" you will find a Federation Folk Dance Camp Scholarship application. These scholarships are provided for by the fund managed by the Scholarship Committee. Each year several tuition-scholarships are offered to folk dancers who the committee judge to be the most deserving among the applicants. The fund is maintained by the money received from the sale of tickets by the Federation and its committee to the annual International Concerts Festival presented by Mr. Irwin Parnes. Usually, for each ticket sold, we receive \$1 for this fund. Last year, this was considerably swelled when both the Aman Ensemble and the

Duquesne Tamburitzans participated in a similar manner, and, also, some individual donations were received. Anyhow, several dancers were enabled to attend folk dance camp in this manner, and again this year we will be sending more. Any camp approved by the Federation may be selected, provided the tuition is covered by the sum allotted. Therefore, if you feel, after reading the application, that you would be eligible and would like to apply, by all means do so. We wish you much luck!
