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

Teacher's Corner

This month Theodor and Lia Vasilescu (photo on cover) will be in California for the Romanian Rendezvous II in Los Angeles on Nov. 20 and the Kolo Festival in San Francisco on Nov. 25-27. Here is some information about their interesting lives.

Theodor Vasilescu was born to a well-to-do. landed

family near Clui in Transvlvania. He had no contact with village life or with peasants as a child, took lessons on the accordion, piano, and violin. At the age of fifteen or sixteen, he began playing tango, foxtrot, and swing music at dance balls. (Americans were in Romania from 1944 to 1947, and American movies with stars such as Frank Sinatra and Dorothy Lamour were very popular. Theodor learned the film's sound track music.) He also played music for a folklore group, realizing that folkloric music could bring his orchestra more contacts. At that time, his father lost his position in the army and the family began selling their possessions to make ends meet. The instructor for the amateur folkloric group Cununa Carpatilor Folklore Ensemble for which he played was the famous instructor and folklore collector, Gheorge Popescu-Judetz, from whom Theodor learned to dance and teach. Often Gheorge noticed that Theodor was correcting the dancers' steps and styling. Theodor ioined the group in 1947, and within two years he had become more knowledgeable about folklore than any of the other members. One of those members was his future wife. Lia. Theodor finished secondary school in 1951 and went

to a polytechnical college where he studied chemistry. The family moved from Cluj to Bucharest in 1944. He

was accepted as part of the youth dance team at the

university. Its rule was "No dance without

and has returned each year. Since then, he has choreographed for professional dance ensembles such as AMAN International Music and Dance Company (Los Angeles), *Budlet* (Hong Kong), *International Danstheater* (Amsterdam), and *L'ensemble National de Folklore "Les Sorti"* (Montreal). He also has choreographed for several large open-air performances. Of course, he has done numerous choreographies for professional and amateur ensembles in Romania.

From 1976 to 1985, Theodor was the Chief Choreographer of Romanian National Professional Ensemble *Rapsodia Romana*. He was head of Choreographie at the National Center for the Preservation and Promotion of Folklore, was head choreographer for *Cununa Carpatilor* Folklore Ensemble in Bucharest, and was a teacher of Romanian folk and character dance at the Theater and Film Academy of Bucharest.

Under the socialist regime it was not easy for Theodor to leave Romania. His first visit to Japan in March of 1986 was possible because it was organized by the Japanese Folkdance Federation, which had official connections in Bucharest. That same year he was invited to teach at **Bora Ozkok**'s camp but was not allowed to leave Romania because of "official national duties." Since 1990, travel has become easier and Theodor has taught in Germany, Hong Kong, and the United States.

Theodor is now an independent choreographer and dance instructor, as well as the leader of the Folklore Dance Academy and the president of the National Association of Folklore Choreographers of Romania.

Wanting to have paper qualifications (specialized studies or a certificate) in folklore, he enrolled in the Academy of Music and later received grants to study in Russia and China. He began writing, editing, and publishing books on dance and methods of teaching folkloric dance, publishing more than 56 volumes. He developed and perfected a dance notation system specifically for folkloric studies that was less complicated than that of Laban. This notation system is currently used by professional and amateur choreographers throughout Romania and other countries. He also authored Folclor Coregrafic Romanesc (Romanian Folklore Dances), based on several years of research throughout Romania, that includes a collection of 130 dances from all parts of the country.

Lia Vasilescu was born in Sibiu, an old town and important cultural center in the Transylvania region. She was attracted by music and dance, and studied classical music and ballet at the local art school. After graduating from high school, she attended the university in Bucharest, graduating as an English teacher. While in Bucharest, she became interested in folk dance and joined the amateur group *Cununa Carpatilor Folklore Ensemble*, where she met Theodor Vasilescu, then the group's choreographer and dance teacher. The group toured Belgium, China, France, Germany, France, Italy, The Netherlands, Russia, Viet Nam, and several other European countries. Lia was a member of the group for 24 years.

Lia and Theodor were married in 1959 and have a son, Florin, who is an engineer and amateur folk dancer, and two grandchildren. Since they met, the couple has worked together in the field of research, enriching their knowledge about the traditional life and the creation of Romanian villages.

Theodor and his charming wife, Lia, have participated in many workshops, which have endeared them to many dance communities. Beginning in 1990, Lia started teaching workshops and week-end camps together with Theodor in California, Maine, New Mexico, New York, Texas, and Washington. They have given workshops and master lessons throughout Canada, Finland, Hong Kong, Germany, Japan, The Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, and the United States, presenting with a style that is swiftly paced, yet attentive to details.

Dance teachers such as **Sunni Bloland** and **Niko Hilferink** popularized many of Theodor's dances.

Dances Theodor and Lia have taught include Alunelul Amestecat din Bistret, Alunelul de la Orodel, Ariciul, Brâu de pe Valea Bistrei, Chilabaua de la Roseti, Dans Tiganesc, Hora Anton Pann, Hora de la Bolintin, Hora de la Mehadica, Hora de la Tulnici, Hora din Campie, Hora din Sud, Hora Lautareasca de la Mitreni, Hora Miresii, Hora Vlaha din Valea Timocului, În Gradina lui Ion, Jianul de la Slanic, Joc Batrînesc, Joc de Fete, Joc de Leagane, Matura de la Felnac, Mugur Mugurel, Mugurletul de la Beiu, Pe Picior, Preumblata de Femei, Sârba de la Balti, Sârba de la Calarasi, Straca-traca, Tarina din Sohodol, Tiocul de la Malesu, Trei Pazeste de la Goicea, Trei Pazeste de la Macesu, and Tropitica de la Balti.

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

CD Review---"Strolling through the Balkans With Dennis Boxell"

"The 'strolling' mood of dance can be delicious. It may lead into a more energetic form of the same dance, or another dance entirely, or it may be just right by itself". Dennis Boxell

Starting with Povoz - picking everybody in the village up for the dance/party/wedding. A great way to start any dance, discussing the latest news of the day.

Carapansko Kolo is an U Sest to ease into a great night of dancing. Moving to Vranjanka - it is good for all ages and dance abilities, with an enjoyable song. The Graovsko is a 10-measure dance, again with a pleasant strolling feel.

The Sopskoto is another Graovsko, but all drums, making it a bit harder, but still strolling along. Just fine enjoyment with the drums as a different feel.

The Pontian section has a Dipat, wonderful as a starting point of exploration of more Pontian dances. which have an excitement of their own. It is like a garden sandwich, always different depending on which veggies are available, but always tasty and fun.

The Macedonian section has a Serghiani and Tis Marias. Gentle with ease and no strain, perfect for everyone. The great part is a slight hold till the last moment, to enjoy every drop of juice from it.

The Thracian section has two Zonaradikos dances. which could be high energy or low, depending on your mood at the moment. The fast Sfarlis gives the fun and

tastiness of still chasing the pot of gold to the right, ending with a sort-of double stamp. An all-around enjoyable CD.

CD Review - "Zhena"

Zhena is a south Slavic word for woman and is also the title of the premier release by the San Pedro based Zhena Folk Chorus who have been performing East European vocal music for nearly 15 years. On this, their first commercial release, the ten member chorus performs songs from throughout the diverse traditions of Eastern European women's music.

Zhena takes us on a musical tour, beginning with songs from the various ethnographic areas of Bulgaria, including the relatively straight forward, percussive style of western Shope as well as the more recognizable languid vocal traditions of Bulgarian Thrace; accompanied here by noted Bulgarian virtuosi Ivan Varimezov on gaida and Tzvetanka Varimezovi on tambura and voice. There are also examples of songs from Georgia and Russia as well as several Turkish village songs accompanied by the characteristically Anatolian baglama saz played by Gonen Kaadeniz and darabuka played by Husnu Akici.

There are also several Croatian songs in the a capella Dalmatian Klapa and Croat Tamburitza traditions, accompanied by the Balanova Ensemble. Notable and rare are the wonderful and eerie, dissonant melodies from Bosnia-Hertzegovina. Amidst the breakup of Yugoslavia over the past decade, much has been written about the disappearing musical traditions of places like Kosovo and Bosnia, and it is inspiring to see a local chorus championing these beautiful ancient melodies.

OKTOBERFEST SAN DIEGO STYLE

September 25 and 26 many dancers found themselves gliding down the freeway headed south to join their far south friends in a weekend of dancing, international folk dancing. As I spoke to **Bob Barckley**, a member of the San Diego dance groups, he mentioned that he doesn't use that complete and descriptive term any longer when explaining to people what he does as a hobby. He mentions that he enjoys international dancing. That seems to be enough to interest others and explain his endeavor. Bob also explained how close the dance groups have come to losing their beautiful site. Only through the combined efforts of the many community groups of San Diego were they able to get the governmental 'powers' to realize the value of the groups that offer dance, song, crafts, music, etc. So many of us have lost valuable venues for dance. Perhaps we need to find ways of reaching out to our communities to help one another retain spaces like that which San Diego's residents enjoy.

Saturday afternoon in the Recital Hall located in the beautiful, well used Balboa Park, folks found their way into the hall and began receiving very basic instruction from **Kin Ho** augmented by his partner **Jeanne Cate**.

These folks helped experienced as well as cold newcomers learn the relation between the already known skill of walking and the basics of dance. I had the pleasure of undergoing this instruction last year and found it to be a learning experience for me at many levels. Both last year and this year it was a review of known dances at one level; but more importantly to me, watching the steps and having the motifs explained in their basic component nature helps me know how to explain movement in a clearer more succinct manner.

Then Georgina Sham took over the instruction duties and began to introduce us to polka as a type of motif and movement. I have often explained to friends that this particular motif is very difficult for me to teach because my learning of it came from very early childhood experiences. Going to Polish weddings as a child introduced me to the basic movements, rhythms and joy that this dance causes in both participant and onlooker but my attempts at breaking the movement down have never been successful. Thanks to Georgina we learned the basics and progressed from very simple dances to more complicated ones and ballroom positions. After Georgina, her mate Lu took over and taught us about waltz movement and choreography. Again he began with a very simple breakdown and gave everyone an opportunity to practice what can be a more complicated variety of motifs. In this dance I find myself counting over and over to stay on the beat.

Saturday evening a dance party took over in the large hall, the Balboa Club, and it was fun to see folks of all ages. The friendly atmosphere continued to engage all the folks who attended and many came who had been at the Recital Hall earlier that day. A younger couple, **Damien Brown** and his friend **Tracey (Cat) Kellner** had stayed for all the instruction and it was exciting to see them back again in the evening using what they had learned and experimenting with more. In contrast to this couple were two older dancers **Arleigh Yewchan**, 90 years of age, and **Monty Felder**, 94 years of age (above left), who participated in almost every dance that was played that night. How exciting to be there with 'folks' enjoying music, rhythms, movement, dance and friendship.

Then Sunday dawned and the dance hall at the Balboa Club was again filled with dancers, learners, observers and tired organizers ready for dance movement after long meetings of the Statewide

of all the many nights you dance for your own pleasure, dedicate this one evening to making your friend's night eniovable.

A Time to Plant, a Time to Reap. Beginners are often hyper-sensitive. They are aware and are hurt when a good dancer, no matter how carefully and inconspicuously, slips out of a circle next to them and joins in again elsewhere. If they get up the courage to ask someone to dance a couple dance, rejection -even a delicately worded one -- is doubly hard because they attribute the rejection to their beginner status. I believe there is nothing more damaging to the health of the dance community than an advanced dancer who habitually rejects a beginner and then accepts the invitation of another advanced dancer.

If you're an established dancer and you become aware of a beginning dancer in your midst, take the time to introduce yourself, and guide the beginner through a dance or two. I have heard so many dancers -- both men and women -- lament the lack of eligible dancer partners, while ignoring the potential that lies in every beginning dancer. I hear dancers say, "I don't like dancing with beginners because then I can't enjoy the dance and I go dancing to have a good time."


Just remember that beginning dancers don't stay beginners forever. In six short months a beginner can turn into a popular, attractive, graceful partner, and if you were there in the beginning, encouraging and helping and guiding, he/she can be your popular, attractive, graceful partner. Take just ten minutes [time for three dances] out of your two hours of dancing. Those ten minutes of cultivation can pay off in the future.

Fresh Water. I remind myself frequently that beginners are the fresh water that keeps our pool from becoming stagnant. Drought puts a strain on the ecosystem. In the case of a dancer-drought, we have the power within us to "make it rain."

Make it one of your New Year's Resolutions to bring at least one new person into the dance community this year. Make another resolution to dance at least one dance each evening with someone new, someone you've never danced with before -- whether by initiating or by accepting an invitation.

[I often think we should provide beginners with buttons or T-shirts bearing Ashley Brilliant's line: "Appreciate me now and avoid the rush...."]

Dancers Speak

This month we are starting a series of articles about the perennial folk dance problem: How to get beginners to try folk dancing, and how to keep them coming back. There will be a lot of concrete suggestions on getting and retaining beginners.

We start off the series with an article by Loui Tucker, who in addition to teaching Israeli and other dances at many locations, has also done some serious thinking about beginners.

THE CARE AND FEEDING OF BEGINNERS

Being a beginner at anything -- whether you're learning tennis or bridge or French cooking or Russian -- is tough. A beginner's self-confidence and poise can really take a beating during the first months of contact with the new activity.

I have had several discussions over the past few months about beginning dancers - with teachers, with current dancers, and with beginners themselves. What are teachers doing to make it easier for beginners? What are current dancers doing to ease the way for their friends who are starting to dance? What do beginning dancers feel is needed to facilitate their learning and increase their comfort level?

Start At the Beginning. Most dancers and teachers agree that if you want to encourage a friend to start dancing, you should first try to find a class for beginners in the area. It is, however, an ideal that is not always possible to attain.

If there isn't a beginners' class, at least pick one of the smaller local classes where the energy level isn't putting stress fractures in the ceiling beams. Beginners have told me there is very little that is more discouraging than attending the most popular and crowded night of dancing and stumbling over your own two feet while watching the stars of the dance floor glide and twirl like Rogers and Astaire.

Beginners frequently have tender, if not downright fragile, egos. We've all seen them retreat to the refreshments table after a discouraging bout with pivot turns. After all, when they look around the room, they can't tell if another dancer has been dancing 20 years or 2 years. Everybody is a better dancer than they are, and the prospect of trying to attain the same skill level is daunting. Besides needing large doses of encouragement, beginners need a class that operates on a lower level that will decrease the perceived distance to the goal, thus increasing the likelihood that the challenge will be accepted.

Multiple Exposures. Beginners should realize that dance classes are like new shoes. Sometimes you have to "try on" more than one class before you find a good fit. Each class provides a slightly different learning environment, social atmosphere, and physical ambience. Even the same teacher on a different night in a different dance hall can create a completely different mood. Beginners need special

encouragement so they won't give up after the first try. I also believe it's important to give beginners more than one reason to dance. This way, if the first evening doesn't provide instant gratification, they'll be more willing to consider going a second time. If they're going to meet people [new in town or newly divorced], mention the aerobic benefits of dance. If they're going to work off stress, remind them that friendships are great tension-relievers.

Which is Your "Inside" Foot?. A first visit to a dance class is not unlike a visit to a foreign country. Wouldn't you at least like to know the words for "please", "thank you", "hello" and "goodbye", and a little about local customs?

Before your friend's first evening of dance, schedule a mutually convenient half-hour and introduce some of the basic vocabulary and etiquette of dancing. Demonstrate the grapevine step and the Yemenite step. Briefly practice step-hops and 3-step turns and pivoting. Mention that most dances move counterclockwise; show him/her how to join a line of dancers and how to hold hands. Talk about standing behind the line of dancers to copy the steps and avoid the shock of joining a line and having it take off to the left for *Cimpoi*. Tell them about wearing layers of clothing and proper shoes. [I've seen so many women come to their first dance class wearing a special dress, ornate jewelry, and high heels!]

Dancers Hold Hands with the Nicest People. A lot of well- meaning dancers hand a friend a flyer and say, "This is a great class. You really should go one night." Most beginners I spoke with agreed that it is far better if you can accompany your friend and act as a tour guide. Introduce the other people at the class. If possible, talk to the class members you know ahead of time and ask for their cooperation in dancing next to your friend in the line dances and with him/her for some of the easy couple dances.

If you know which dances a beginner can handle, request a few of them. Enlist the teacher as well; if you've taught your friend *Tzadik Katamar* and *Ersko Kolo*, ask the teacher to play them early in the evening.
