Federation Corner

The Prescott International Folk Dance group was founded in 1979 by the husband and wife team of **Jack & Susie Yule,** folk dance teachers from New York. It began as a P.E. credit course at our local community college. Shortly afterwards they initiated additional folk dancing outdoors on our courthouse plaza on Wednesday summer evenings, with audience participation. While the courthouse continued, they soon switched from teaching the college class to forming a private class in their home for experienced dancers.

As this group advanced in level, there was a need for a beginner and intermediate class. Another teacher from the courthouse, Sue Steger arranged for City of Prescott sponsorship of afternoon beginner and evening intermediate classes in city school and park facilities, which she taught. The group began performing in costume, usually without compensation, at various festivals and events in our community and elsewhere.

My involvement with the group began in 1994, a few years after moving to Prescott from Chicago (where I had never danced in my life). I would accompany my young daughter to watch her dance with the folk dancers summer evenings and I was drawn by the music and rhythms to try it myself. That fall I joined the class and began a "fast track" rise. I was first talked into becoming the replacement beginner class teacher the following fall, then to being the Tuesday advanced class teacher at the Yule home. At age 92, Jack Yule was too ill to go on. His wife Susie sensed I was the man to take over. Next, I agreed to also coteach the Wednesday intermediate class with **Sue**

Statewide 2011

Preparations for Statewide 2011 in Solvang are moving into high gear. The web site is up and running, with additional information being added as it becomes available (www.statewidefolkdance.com). Registration forms have been mailed to clubs, t-shirts have been printed and will be available at the Spring Festival in Culver City, dance lists are being compiled, decorations are being created, and sound equipment is being tested.

The Festival Format

We will be dancing at 2 different venues. The Friday night dance party will be at Bethania Lutheran Church in the Parish Hall. They have a beautiful wooden floor which is less than a year old. It is home to the Solvang Dancers. All other events will be held at the Veterans Memorial Building on the east side of town.



You will find that the format for this Festival is slightly different. All teaching by the master teachers Yves and France Moreau will be done in the morning sessions Saturday and Sunday. The afternoon sessions will have short reviews of those dances taught in the morning interspersed throughout a dance program. On Saturday afternoon we will also have David Heald teaching some Scandinavian dances. The evening dance parties Friday, Saturday, and Sunday will be just that - dancing all the time (including the dances we learned in the morning and reviewed in the afternoon) with **Zimzala** playing several sets of live music Saturday and Sunday. Monday dancing will be an all request program with barbeque.

The Food

On the registration form you will notice that there are 3 optional meals. Sunday luncheon is Installation of Federation Officers from both north and south. Historically this event has been held in a restaurant or catered. The cost has often kept attendance low. This year we have lowered the cost in the hope that more dancers will attend. This event will be held in the Legion Wing of the Veterans Memorial Building, a lovely room that will hold up to 100 people. The menu has not been confirmed yet, but there will be lots of good food for both vegetarians and meat eaters. Please take this opportunity to meet your officers and find out what new and exciting things are going on in the Federation.

This year we have added a light lunch on Saturday (also in the Legion Wing, but much less formal) for those of you who don't want to fight the holiday weekend crowds. It will consist of a croissant sandwich, salad, chips, drink, and dessert. There will be music available if you want an extra dose of dancing.

Monday there will be an old fashion holiday barbeque on the patio with all-request dancing in the Legion Wing.

In addition to the actual meals there will be snacks throughout the day and ice cream sundaes both Saturday and Sunday evenings.

Lodging

The host hotel is Holiday Inn Express. Located on the west side of Solvang, it is approximately 6 blocks from the main dance venue and 4 blocks from Friday night's venue. Several months ago we reserved a block of rooms at a special rate. Because this is a holiday weekend their regular rates have increased substantially, so it is important that you reserve before the deadline of April 22nd. All reservations must go thru **Beverly Barr** to get the Statewide rate (see the registration form in this issue for rates). The rooms are available with 1 or 2 beds so can sleep up to 4 people per room. All the rooms are equipped with a small fridge and microwave plus wi-fi, hair dryer, iron and board. They serve a full complimentary breakfast in a spacious breakfast room. Other lodgings in the area include many small inns in Solvang, as well as motels in Buellton (4 mi.), Los Alamos (17 mi.), Santa Ynez (3 mi.), and Lompoc (21 mi). Camping is available at



The folk dance band Zimzala began, as so many bands do, in a garage. **Errol Strelnikoff**'s garage to be exact. Errol is a hot drummer, and he wanted to see what folk dance music would sound like with a full drum kit driving the beat. So one beautiful sunny afternoon a group of friends gathered in Errol's garage a few blocks from the beach in San Clemente to make some joyful noise. And, trust me, between my electric keyboard, **Don Robinson**'s electric bass, **Lee Otterholt'**s voice, and Errol's drum kit, it was truly both joyful and noisy.

We were still making plenty of joyful noise, but we had added more than a few pieces that tended more toward beautiful than noisy. And we were starting to get local gigs. But we still didn't have a name.

If you've ever started a business - or a band - you know that picking a name that captures the essence of what you do can be really tough. Even if you come up with a name that you like, chances are it's already taken. We couldn't go on calling ourselves the "Fab Four". Not only is that name already taken (by The Beatles), but there weren't always four of us - we often performed with an extra musician or two sitting in with us. One afternoon we were tossing around ideas for a band name and I suggested that we look at "surfer dude" jargon. Lee (our own resident surfer dude) came back a week later with some terms he found in a "surfer dictionary", and, just like that, the bandwithout-a-good-name became Zimzala, which means "the feeling you get with the sun at your back, the wind in your face, and the sand between your toes".

As we've matured as a band, so has our sound. We've added some new members to the band: Errol had to drop out because his job takes him out of town on very short notice, but we were fortunate to discover that his 13-year-old son **Sasha** inherited both his father's drumming ability and his Zimzala spirit. **Lisa Taylor'**s voice, and the chemistry onstage between her and Lee, are simply amazing. And **Patty McCollom**'s tin whistle adds fire and soul to the repertoire.



Neither Errol nor Sasha could make it, but we were fortunate enough to snag one of the hottest Balkan drummers in the business, **Jerry Summers**. And to flesh out the sound for our instrumental-only pieces, we've borrowed **Jim Garner** from **Interfolk** on violin for the weekend.

We're excited to have the opportunity to bring the Zimzala spirit to Statewide this year!

Recent Events

From the list of folk dance groups who signed up for free CDs, one can see that dancers were from at least 15 Chinese/Taiwanese groups and 16 non-Chinese groups. It was a record. This was the very first time that members from so many Chinese/Taiwanese groups and so many American groups danced together under one roof.

In this event of Chinese New Year Festival and East-West Folk Dance Workshop, food is one of the major highlights. The food was contributed by all participants. Some people brought with them extra amounts of food. Staff members of the CFD took care to keep the table supplied with delicious food for the dancers. The dishes were so good that some people forgot to go back to dance!

During the intermission, some group photographs were taken. Near the end of the workshop, the CFD gave away Chinese-style red envelopes to the first 100 people who paid for the event. Some participants wondered why most of those first 100 went to the Chinese/Taiwanese dancers. It was because most of them were pre-registered. At least four Chinese groups had all or almost all of their members pre-registered and made the non-refundable donations. They were all included in the first one hundred and have names put into the one hundred name tag holders provided by the CFD. Some other dancers might have not been well informed and so missed the chance to receive the red envelopes, twenty of which had an extra prize.

After the festival, some people got together at the Happy House Seafood Restaurant, a short distance away, to have a chance to talk further with the master teacher Yang Chang Shong. The teacher and special guests were paid for by the CFD and each of the others paid to enjoy a ten-course seafood banquet. Master teacher Cristian had sore throat and decided to, together with Sonia, skip the "thank you banquet" in order to get some rest. Thanks to them for working so hard in teaching at many places without much rest.

The general support from the Folk Dance Federation, South, Inc., made it possible to allow dancers to dance together at this historical event at only a small burden to the participants.

East and West alike, let's keep on dancing together. *Gung hey fat choy!*

Steger. Sue and I attended numerous California folk dance workshops and festivals, including six Camp Hess Kramers and several "Statewides" and also Idaho and New Mexico events for fresh material for the group. Many of our current and past members are former California folk dancers. We have had folk dancers from the Phoenix, Tucson and Flagstaff groups join us many times and even **Beverly** and **Irwin Barr**'s group visited us for dance parties.

With a background in construction and home building, I had no idea I could do and enjoy dances like these, let alone teach them to others (some of whom I think had vastly more experience). It has given me great satisfaction to bring so many "favorites" to our group these 16+ years and see the joy on their faces when they "get it".

After Jack Yule's death at age 95, the advanced group merged with the intermediate group and then when Sue Steger semi-retired to start a new beginner class (which no longer exists), I assumed full responsibility for folk dancing in Prescott.

The group faced a major hurdle in 2010 when our city stopped sponsoring groups like ours by no longer providing facilities and liability insurance. The costs of renting our school facility and an individual insurance policy were beyond our reach. It looked like the end of folk dancing in Prescott, after 30+ straight years. Because Sue and I had attended the California Federation Statewide in Las Vegas, which is outside California, I wondered if somehow the Federation could help us. I contacted my good friends Beverly and Irwin Barr and that began the process for us to come under the affordable wing of the Federation to preserve our tradition and passion of folk dancing here in Prescott.

The group and I would like to whole-heartedly thank all who had a part in our rescue!

THE FIRST ANNUAL CHINESE NEW YEAR FESTIVAL

Wow! What a surprise, one hundred and sixty people gathered together in the Palms Park Community Center in Lakewood. The Cerritos Folk Dancers (CFD) hosted the Chinese New Year Festival on February 13th.

The festival opened with a lion dance performed by **Wen Chiang** and **Sue Chen.** The lion dance is a popular activity performed during lunar New Year periods in China, Taiwan, and some other Asian countries. Two persons play the lion head and lion tail and imitate the movements of a lion. Since it is believed that this kind of lion will bring good fortune to

people, all stores in the business world welcome lion dance teams and prepare "red envelopes" to "feed" the "lions" that visit the stores. In China and Taiwan, there are noisy firecrackers and drum sounds. In our festival, the lion was performed with the music of *Shih Wu* in the background.

Before the workshop started, there was a thirty-minute period for the participants to dance together. To celebrate the Year of the Rabbit, the first dance was *Finnjenka* (or *Jenca*), which is called the "Bunny Hop" in Taiwan. Dancers jumped around the floor like happy bunnies.

After warming up with some Romanian dances and some dances choreographed by Yang Chang Shong, the "East-West Folk Dance Workshop" officially started.

Master teachers **Cristian Florescu** and **Sonia Dion** taught Romanian dances which were appreciated by everybody. Some people learned the steps from the Laguna Festival and some other review parties. But they still followed Cristian and Sonia to the East-West workshop.

Master teacher **Yang Chang Shong** flew over from Taiwan especially for this East-West Workshop. He, together with his partner **Julia Lai**, taught some Taiwanese favorites and a couple of English classic dances. Two of the five dances he taught in the workshop were choreographed by him. Dancers from Taiwan admire him as a famous pioneer in promoting folk dances in Taiwan.

The ballroom in the community center was adorned with many Chinese garlands to signify the style of the Chinese New Year. Some red lanterns were hung by the door as well as in the room. Large and long lucky inscriptions were displayed high on the wall. Some dancers, Chinese and American alike, wore Chinese style dressings. Sonia wore a beautiful Chinese garment that she bought in Hong Kong.

There were at least 159 people attending this event of "East Meets West." Among them, about 99 were Chinese/Taiwanese. It is great. So many dancers of different ethnic backgrounds got into the same room dancing together!

The world was made smaller because the people of different regions were dancing together. The international dances from different countries were shared with the group.

SONIA AND CRISTIAN IN SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA



In the month of February, **Cristian Florescu** and **Sonia Dion** were the guests for a series of Romanian dance workshops all over Southern California, as well as in Las Vegas. The character of the workshops varied: some consisted of mainly teaching; others

were more festive, with a party following the dance instructions (as in San Diego); others provided amazing food for sustenance (as at the LIFE Balkan dancers or the wonderful Valentine's party in San Pedro); lastly, there was a full-blown festival set up by the Cerritos Folk Dancers, all with teaching (by Cristian & Sonia and **Yang Chang Shong**, a teacher from Taiwan), dance party, and celebration of the Chinese New Year with dancing dragons and songs and food.

I had the pleasure to spend most of those days with Cristian and Sonia. These were days (and half-nights) of laughter, sightseeing (not enough), eating (Sonia's new love was Trader Joe's, and every free moment was spent investigating and sampling the store's vast inventory), friendship, and navigating overcrowded freeways. But when evening came and the workshops began - a different entertainment took place: it was evident that Cristian and Sonia were teaching while having fun and enjoying every moment of it. After attending nine workshops, I learned that one should not forget to breathe (*Respire!*), one should know how to count (Mathematique!), one should have patience and "Please wait a little" (Chotto matte, kudasal! (Japanese)), one should shout out loud whatever comes to mind while dancing (the famous Romanian Strigaturi) and, most important, wish each other "Bon Voyage" when a dance was about to begin.

Before they left, Sonia told me about a letter written to them from Sarah Clark, a dancer at Stockton Folk

Dance camp last summer. The letter basically says it all, and, with permission, it is reproduced below.

Dancers Speak

If we tell teenagers that folk dancing is best appreciated by mature adults in a committed relationship and they should save themselves for it, they will be sneaking off behind the barn to practice their *racenitza* faster than you can say "Quick, quick, slow." They will be gathering for clandestine folk dance parties in darkened basements when their parents are out of town.

If we pass laws prohibiting folk dancing for anyone under 21, young people will be found in deserted rural parking lots gathered around a boom box daring each other to "do *Florecica* again!"

All kidding aside, I am actually going to say something radical: I don't think we should be focusing our energies on getting young people into folk dancing. What? Why not? Bear with me - this is going to take some explaining.

First, I think young people are already being exposed to folk dancing, perhaps not in every school or church youth group, but it is happening. I have plenty of colleagues who specialize in teaching dance to children from kindergarten to teenagers and up into college. Young people are dancing. No, not in the numbers we saw in the 50s, 60s and 70s, and yes, their contact with dance is more successful in some communities than in others, but it is happening.

I'm more interested in what causes them to stop dancing in their twenties, which was when many of the dancers my age started dancing - in junior college, college, and freshly minted college graduates.

One drawback today that didn't exist thirty-plus years ago is the age difference between the young people potentially joining existing adult dance groups and the age of the folks already in those groups. For example, when I joined at 21, there were plenty of other young people and the experienced dancers were in their 30s and 40s - a gap of 10-20 years. As it stands now, if a young dancer just out of college, who was used to dancing with dancers about the same age, wanders into an adult folk dance group, the age gap is going to be more like 30-50 years and there will be few if any other young people.

I've said before in other articles that we also face greater competition from other dance forms: ballroom dance, salsa, hip-hop, line dancing, even contra and swing classes. Young people have more types of dances from which to select. And you know that if it's

on television or has been made popular by a movie, young people will be interested in taking those classes. We can't do much about the competition factor (unless you happen to have an "in" with a television or motion picture producer...), but there are two more factors that will continue to be a problem for us: marriage and families.

If a young dancer marries a non-dancer, we're probably going to lose the dancer. Sure, there are few instances where we actually bring the non-dancer over to our side, but it is less likely. I suggested at a dinner recently that, much like certain religious groups that frown on inter-faith marriage, we should start having interventions when a young dancer starts dating a non-dancer. I said we could even find out when the wedding is taking place and, when the minister intones that line "If any of you know why these persons should not be joined together in Holy Matrimony,..." we could all stand up and say, "We do!" (*Relax, I was just kidding!*)

But even if two dancers get lucky, find each other, fall in love, and get married, there's the children and family issue. Raising children is hard, time-consuming, energy-sapping work, and fitting in an evening or two of dancing is not easy when you have children. If a couple can find the time and energy to go dancing, there's the cost of child care on top of the cost of the dance class. Few, if any, dance clubs offer child care on site (what a concept!) and few are child friendly when a dancing couple has children who are old enough to be able to join in the dance. Yet, that idea (child care solution for dancers) isn't where I'm going with this article either (though it might be the subject of a future article....)

So here's where I'm going: I can think of at least four couples who've returned to dancing within the last two years because their children were (1) finally old enough they could be trusted to stay home alone or (2) had graduated from high school and gone off to college. These former dancers came back to dancing after a 15-20 year hiatus! I know of two women who married non-dancers and, in the last three years, found their way back to dancing (divorce in one case, death in the other). Perhaps this is the market that is waiting to be tapped: former dancers who are suddenly free to dance again.

I am considering exploring the cost of placing some ads in local papers that say something like:

The other highlight will be being with all of the other dancers in attendance. Besides the great music, dance, and atmosphere, it is always the people. What makes an occasion like Statewide special for you?

PEELED GRAPES or BREAKFAST IN BED WITH **BILL COPES**

Preface: My guru, brain specialist, Dr. Daniel **Amen,** teaches in his book, *Change Your Brain Change* Your Life, that among many strategies for conquering depression is to reinforce the deep limbic bonds by listing ten joyful experiences in your life, and then relive those memories internally, using all your senses I am writing this memoir to cheer me when I feel blue, and to reinforce those deep limbic bonds.

Recently one evening I was dancing with the Stanford Folk Dance Club when a young man was being especially friendly. Finally I asked him, "Do I know you?" He answered, "I know you peeled grapes". Instantly I was connected.

It was the summer of 1985. I was at the week-long Balkan Music and Dance Camp in the Mendocino Woodlands. The camp was miles deep into the magnificent redwood forest. Towering trees provided shade and the river running through offered spontaneous swimming. The facilities were primitive, the food was superb, and what was really great was

how all of us were creating live Balkan dance music the clock around. Sounds of dumbeks and tupans (drums), tamburas (stringed instruments), screeching zurnas (flutes), gajdas (bagpipes), accordions, and other ethnic instruments came through the redwood trees from classes and practice sessions.

That year the camp had a shortfall of money, and at dinner the previous night campers had offered various services to be auctioned for the benefit of camp expenses. The kitchen staff's contribution was "Breakfast in Bed for Two". Tambura teacher and popular bachelor **Bill Cope** had won the bid for \$250. Upon being named the winner he immediately announced that he was only one person, and the second place was now up for auction.

I had just retired from teaching, and having some extra cash I won that bid for \$150. Excitement was high. The guys lifted Bill onto their shoulders and paraded him around the rustic barn used as a cafeteria accompanied by drums and horns. Not to be outdone, the girls picked me up on their shoulders and paraded me around the room till Bill and I were brought face to face. I had never met him before. He pulled out a bottle of slivovitz (plum brandy), and offered it to me. - Sandy Helperin I took a swig accompanied by loud cheering and applause, and then he kissed me.

> I had pitched my tent in the meadow, and early the next morning someone brought me a wake-up cup of coffee. I came out of the tent, brought my camp chair, and before I could sit in it, a young woman brought a madras spread and draped it around me. Another camper adorned me with silver jewelry - necklaces, bracelets and a jingling anklet. By now there were an accordionist and drummer playing Croatian kolo music to serenade me, and a few nearby tenters were improvising dances with coffee cups - the leader calling out, "Coffee cup on left shoulder, turn around", "Coffee cup on right knee, swivel knee left to right"; coffee cup hackey-sack! Soon four husky guys showed up and each picked up a leg of my chair, hoisted me into the air above their heads, and carried me through the forest. My head was hitting the branches, but I did not complain. We arrived at Bill Copes tent. He had set up a cabana (with a printed sign declaring "Cope acabana") in front and was sitting at a small table in anticipation of breakfast. My transporters set me down across from him.


