Federation Corner



I was raised in the mostly Polish and Yugoslav south side of Milwaukee so grew up with a love of their rhythms. I started folk dancing in southern California in answer to an ad stating that an ethnic folkdance group was forming and no partners were necessary. I called in reply to the ad and started this long

love of Balkan dance in 1968 with Ann Litvan's newly formed group in Brea once a week. My daughters were ages 8 and 10 at the time so that limited my time for evenings out. Then I was introduced to Garden Grove Folkdancers and found that there were other children attending so I followed suit and began enjoying two nights dancing every week This group had members taking turns at taking home the equipment and records, planning the early programming for the following week, acting as deejay and then passing the job to another individual. I enjoyed taking my turn.

While a student at CSUF a folkdance group was formed and we followed the Garden Grove system of caretaker/deejay. Our presidents served for one year and so I took a turn at that. Our group numbered about 40. We had only six paid members at the time that we disbanded because we no longer had a CSUF professor to sponsor us. We announced our plans to all who wished to become members so that they could partake in the distribution of our records. Paid members took turns selecting records until all were chosen. The money that we had was approximately \$100. We threw an all-expense paid party at the newly opened Veselo Selo.

Veselo Selo was opened on June 2, 1970, and is celebrating its 43rd Anniversary this year. The address of 719 N. Anaheim St. was originally a ballet studio and the folkdance venue was founded by Anne Billingsly and Pat Adamek (nee Thomas.) We had it for four days and nights as the rent was paid monthly and featured specialty nights of various countries with teachers for each specialty, i.e. Romanian, Hungarian, etc. I enjoyed more nights working on style of particular countries and delved further into Romanian with Mihai David, Greek with Fred Marageh, Scandinavian with Ted Martin & Donna Tripp, Israeli with Shlomo Bachar & Israel Yakovee and recently Mid-Eastern with Henrietta *Federation Corner continued on page 8...*

Romania's Caluşari

The 50th day after Orthodox Easter marks the beginning of the fearsome five days when the dead rise to cast evil, sickness and bad luck about the countryside. It's Whitsuntide or Pentecost or - in Romania *rusalii*. In a world guided by superstition, the people turn to rituals older than memory to protect themselves from these evil forces and ensure fertility, long life and good luck.

Early on the morning of that day, the women of the village rise before dawn and move silently in the early morning chill to the cemetery where they will honor the deceased members of their neam, or extended family. Candles are placed on the graves to provide light to the deceased, since their needs are considered to be the same as the living. It is a time of deep mourning for those on the other side of the same universe. And it is a plea for benevolence from the deceased spirit.



a group of men from white trousers and gathered at a secret ceremonial site to ing danger. They are led by a *vataf* with absolute, unquestioned authority over the group. A flag or steaq is constructed to lead them on their coming ritual and represent their power. Garlic and wormwood

are wrapped on the end of a 10' pole with a white cloth. On a shorter pole, a rabbit skin is stretched over a wood frame – the *cioc* – for the *vataf* to carry as a symbol of his power and authority.

An oath is taken to abide by the groups' laws and traditions, to obey the vataf, share in the gifts to come, abstain from sex and, above all, keep the group's secrets - under a promise of vile sexual de-

The evening before, the village, dressed in long white shirts, had become *calusari* - the major force of protection from the impendfilement of an offending caluşari's family. This is serious business. During *rusalii* they will replace the sorcerer as healer and protector of the village. Once through the cycle of the *calus* and the *legares* calusari is completed.

The calusari are now supernatural beings, removed from their normal lives as farmers or tradesmen. Their task is to bring their magic to the village, healing the sick, bringing luck and health to the young, protection from evil, fertility to parents and crops alike. Their white costume festooned with bells around the knees and woven strips of fabric crossing over the shoulders and carrying a stick about one meter in length, they begin their visit to the villagers' homes.

The mute accompanies the group, a masked creature who carries a wooden sword and acts as the clown. He represents death and resurrection and being hit with his wooden sword is good luck. Many villagers attempt to touch the mute as he passes by. He partakes in the ritual by scribing a sacred dance circle in the vard of the homes, wherein the *calusari* will perform their magical dance.

As the group reaches each house, the *vataf* knocks on the door and asks permission to dance. Of course! The *calusari* are welcomed with open arms. To do otherwise could result in illness and even death. The *steag* is posted in the center of the circle with a bowl of water and a plate containing stalks of



grain, garlic, salt and wormwood, provided by the home owner. Preparations completed, the *caluşari* begin their dance, accompanied by uncostumed musicians.

And what a dance it is – the *caluş* - beginning with a slow strutting walk around the circle, the dance slowly quickens into a frenzy of brilliant footwork, accompanied by shouts and calls, ringing bells and magnificent music driving them on. Great agility and stamina is required for the squats, leaps and athletic movement of the dance. To the *caluşari*, the dance is the medium for delivering their magic.

As the *caluşari* make their rounds, it is possible that two groups may meet. When they do, excitement runs high. In former years, a fight could ensue, sometimes to the death. In more civilized times, a dance competition replaces the brawl. One can only imagine the theater of it all, much to the villagers' delight. If time and distance permit, the *caluşari* will visit other nearby villages, spreading both their magic and rewards.

Mothers bring their children for the *caluşari's* attentions. If the child is healthy, the *caluşari* may hold the child while dancing, ensuring long life and good health. If the child is ill, the caluşari will leap over the prostrate child three times in the traditional healing ritual. On occasion, women and unmarried girls may dance with the *caluşari*, thus ensuring health, fertility and attraction of a suitable husband. The *caluşari* are indeed very powerful forces.

On the second Tuesday after *rusalii* begins, the group meets at the *vataf's* home to share the gifts and to conduct the *dezhgares caluşari* the ritual returning them to the status of villagers. The *steag* and *cioc* are ceremoniously dismantled, each man taking a part of it for himself. Then the pole is held horizontally and dropped. The men flee in all directions, then return and greet each other as though away for a long time. The pole is then buried in a secret place and the *rusalii* has been laid safe for another year.

Though modern forces have diluted the *caluşar*i ritual, the *caluş* is in the repertoire of most of Romania's professional dance companies and has been performed in dance concerts around the world. None who see it are unmoved by its power and energy.

The *caluş* should not be considered a folk dance, rather a dance of religious ritual. It is not danced by



the people, but by specifically designated individuals who perform it under a specific situation for spiritual reasons. It is related to the Morris Dance of England and to various other rituals throughout Europe where health, fertility, good luck and sex appeal are encouraged through the dance.

For further readings about the caluş and caluşari, read *Caluş, Symbolic Transformation in Romanian Ritual* by Gail Kligman, published by University of Chicago Press.

MAYPOLE DANCE AT PASADENA CO-OP

May Day, or Beltane, comes at the exact mid-point of Spring and, as such, calls for celebration. The first maypoles were pine trees, which were carried in processions to Ancient Roman temples to honor the goddess Flora. In Pagan Medieval Europe — especially Germany, England, the Slavic countries and parts of Scandinavia — a tree would be cut down and brought from the woods into the village by a procession at sunrise, while horns and flutes played. The tree, a maypole, would be festooned with ribbons, garlands, flowers, wreaths,

and other decorations to celebrate Beltane.

Originally, the tradition was to decorate a pole with garlands of flowers and leaves. These were known as ribbon-less maypoles and dancers simply circled the maypole in time with the music which was often provided by pipe and tabor, fiddle and whatever other instruments could be found. Later, ribbons were attached to the top of the maypole and dancers wound in different directions around the maypole.

REFLECTIONS AND IMPRESSIONS

Many years ago on my first trip to Europe, I purchased dolls in folk dress from each country that I visited. That was the beginning of a life-long passion. My dolls come mostly from Eastern Europe, the Balkans, and Greece. However, my biggest satisfaction has come from making folk costumes for the 18-inch doll.

About 14 years ago, on our way back from the Tamburitza Extravaganza, which was held in Reno, we stopped to visit a dear friend, Patty Butler, in the Sacramento area. Patty is an avid Barbie doll collector, but also has an interest in other dolls. She had a book entitled *Sew the International Wardrobe for the 18-Inch Dolls* which I begged to borrow. She reluctantly agreed with the condition that I purchase my



own copy. My first project was the Czech doll. This I made mostly from remnants and scraps left over from my own costume projects. I only had to purchase some lace, stockings and shoes. That led to my making other costumes from the book – Dutch, Norwegian, Turkish, Irish, and Russian.

I was bitten by the bug! It led to my checking out McCall's and Simplicity patterns for the 18-inch doll, including storybook dolls such as Little Red Riding Hood, Cinderella, and a variety of Princesses. I have designed my own patterns for Serbian, Hungarian, Romanian, Dalmatian, and Posavina dolls. To complete a typical doll's costume she needs: blouse, skirt, apron, underwear, stockings, shoes, headdress, and jewelry. At times, I'll add some accessory, such as a dream catcher for the Native American doll.

There are various 18-inch dolls available – such as American Doll, Battat, Madame Alexander, Heidi Ott, etc. The most expensive are the American Dolls but my preference is Heidi Ott. She was distributed through Target about 15 ago. Now, the only way I can get her is through eBay. So, many days you'll catch me at the computer bidding on a Heidi Ott doll.

Each of my dolls has a name. There is Katrina from Holland, Lara from Russia, Cveti from Bulgaria, Misha from Serbia, as well as Little Red for Red Riding Hood, and Annie, an old-fashioned school teacher, etc. On occasion, I have displayed a few of my dolls at a time. It is such a joy to share the love of dolls coupled with the love of folk costume.

I am always thrilled to learn that a folk dancer may also have a doll collection. Perhaps we should have a mini doll convention.

ANSWER TO LAST MONTH'S QUESTION OF THE MONTH ON 'FOLK DANCING IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES'


