## Teacher's Corner

Our featured teacher is Ahmet Lüleci, who will be teaching soon in our area. The following bio was taken from Dick Oakes' website: http:// www.phantomranch.net/folkdanc/folkdanc.htm



Ahmet Lüleci, a native of Turkey, is an accomplished folkdance teacher, performer, choreographer, and musician, as well as a researcher of Anatolian folk culture. Since his arrival in North America in 1985, he has been promoting the Turkish folklore all over the world, to amateur as well as professional groups.

Ahmet has been performing Turkish folk dancing and music since the age of eight. At the age of 15, he became a dance instructor. He taught several ensembles in Ankara, Istanbul, Eskisehir, and Bursa.

He has danced with numerous school ensembles and private associations, many of which won outstanding awards in city-wide and national competitions. Between 1973 and 1985 he participated in international folk dance festivals and competitions throughout western and eastern Europe. In addition, he taught ensembles that appeared in more than 60 programs broadcast nationally in Denmark, France, Germany, the Netherlands, and Turkey.

Ahmet also served as Director of Dances for *Hoy-Tur*, long considered one of Turkey's leading folk dance associations.

In 1985, Ahmet's research on "The Culture in Southern Anatolia" won the first prize at the national competition held by "Youth Sport and Education Ministry." Since 1985 he has continued his work in the United States and Canada, Asia, Europe, and South America.

In 1988, Ahmet became director of the Bostonbased *Kemençe Dance Ensemble*. In 2001, he was the Artistic Director of *Collage International Dance Ensemble* (formerly Kemençe), Ahmet received the Dance Umbrella Boston Moves 2001 Award, a commission to create a world-premiere work for Boston audiences.

Ahmet choreographed a dance suite for the Brigham Young University *International Folk Dance*

## Susan Cashion

The following obituary was printed in the Tuesday, September 10, 2013 edition of the Los Angeles Times, and is re-printed here with permission.



Susan Cashion, a former Stanford University dance director and a key figure in the development of the Mexican folkloric dance movement in California, died Aug. 29 after being struck by a commuter train in Palo Alto. She was 70.

The Pasadena native spent more than three decades teaching Mexican, Latin American and modern

dance at Stanford and founded or helped found a string of folkloric companies in the Bay Area that inspired similar organizations up and down the state. In 1969, Cashion and longtime partner **Ramón Morones** co-founded *Los Lupeños de San José*, which in its heyday in the 1970s enjoyed a reputation as the elite folkloric dance group in California, on par with professional companies in Mexico.

As a faculty member at Stanford, Cashion advocated for the study of other non-Western dance forms, such as Afro-Caribbean, and the recognition of ethnic dance as both an art form and a cultural practice.

She also helped establish the first national organization of Mexican folkloric dance groups, the *Asociación Nacional de Grupos Folklóricos*, which holds annual conferences. In 1980 Cashion received an award from the Mexican government "for significant contributions to the culture and teaching of Mexican folklore in the United States of America."

Cashion committed to modernizing and preserving folkloric dance at a time of social change and Mexican American cultural affirmation.

"The whole movement of ballet folkloric has coincided with a cultural revolution," Cashion told the San Jose Mercury News in 1994. "It is part of the awareness of one's own heritage. Dance is so beautiful and passionate you don't need the language to understand it."

Susan Valerie Cashion was born April 20, 1943, in Pasadena. She went to UCLA to study modern dance,

but her life took an unexpected turn when she traveled to Mexico to study Spanish.

There, a traditional Mexican dance performance in Guadalajara captivated Cashion. She changed her studies to Mexican and Latin American dance and ultimately devoted her UCLA master's thesis to Mexican dance.

While researching in Guadalajara, she met Morones, who was studying painting at the University of Guadalajara and dancing with the university's *folklórico* dance company. The meeting sparked a decades-long romance. When Cashion enrolled at Stanford to pursue a master's in anthropology, Morones joined her.

At the time, professional Mexican folkloric dance companies in California were few and far between, with folkloric essentially limited to couples at the family and church level. In founding Los Lupeños de San José, Cashion and Morones engineered a modernized, professional company that translated folkloric dance into a performance genre, marked by sophisticated choreography. They also opened the group to non-Latinos.

By the time of her death, Cashion's name had become well-known among the now-widespread folklórico dance groups throughout the West and Southwest.

"She was very dedicated in the authenticity of the folklore and promoting and touching as many dancers as possible," said Ana de la Tejera, secretary of the Asociación Nacional de Grupos Folklóricos and founder of Ballet Folklórico de Riverside.

Cashion and Morones planned to retire to Cashion's ranch in the Jalisco state of Mexico. But in 2011, Morones was shot and killed on the ranch, reportedly during an argument with an employee.

After Morones' death, Cashion returned to the Bay Area and became co-artistic director of Los Lupeños.

Upon her retirement from Stanford in 2007, Cashion founded a nonprofit organization called the Cashion Cultural Legacy, dedicated to preserving and archiving Mexican dance and culture. The organization funds a U.S.-Mexico exchange program for dancers and choreographers and now awards a scholarship in Morones' name.

She is survived by a brother, Michael.



Ensemble and had the troupe's costumes specially made and shipped from Turkey. Some of the other notable performing ensembles with which he has worked include the famed AMAN Folk Ensemble of Los Angeles (in 1991, Ahmet joined AMAN's artistic staff as resident choreographer), Mandala of Boston, Massachusetts, Komenka of New Orleans, Louisiana, Tamzara of Boston, Massachusetts, Les Sortilèges of Montréal, Canada, Vinok of Edmonton, Canada, Omega of Honolulu, Hawaii, Tam ti Delam of Sept-Îles, Canada, and Kineskamie of Baie-Commeau, Canada. In his native Turkey, he has choreographed for Hoy-Tur, Tur-Hoy, and Gehem of Ankara, Anadolu Universitesi of Eskisehir, Butfod of Bursa, and Folkrur of İstanbul.

Baglama and davul are the folk instruments Ahmet most enjoys playing. Indeed, his college major was music, with specialization in voice. Ahmet's love of folksongs and fascination with folk dance led him to conduct scholarly research into the historical, social, and cultural background of the costumes and spoon dances from Turkey's Mediterranean coast. In 1997, Ahmet completed a second degree in Fine Arts, specializing in Graphic Design.

Ahmet has taught at the major folk dance camps in the United States and Canada, including the San Francisco Kolo Festival and the Stockton Folk Dance Camp in California, and continues to teach workshops throughout the United States from his home base in Boston, Massachusetts. He has taught workshops and camps in Japan, Holland, and Germany.

Ahmet is co-founder and co-director of the annual World Music & Dance Camp at Cape Cod, Massachusetts.

Among Ahmet's publications is an exhaustive, 400-page folklore study on the folkdances of Turkey for which he was awarded First Place in the 1985 national competition in research on the folk dances by the Turkish Ministry of Youth, Sports, and Education.



October's introductory teaching will be by **Ann Armstrong** who will teach *Ashrei Ha'ish* (from Israel) and *Bufcansko Oro* (from Macedonia). If there's time, she will also teach *Ini Vitui* (from Romania). In our intermediate teaching slot, **Marsha Fenner** will teach *Rokoko* (from Croatia).

There will be no teaching on October 25. Instead, we will have a *Halloween Party*. Our Fifth Friday Band will play some dances and the rest of the program will be all-request. This same night we will have our *And Now For Something Completely Different* activity. We will learn to sing the lyrics of the popular Israeli dance, *Od Lo Ahavti Dai*.

November 1, will be a special *Erica Goldman evening*. She will begin by teaching *Jungle*, a very easy and exceptionally fun dance, suitable for children and light-hearted adults. row by row – forming lines for a Grand March toward refining their minds. Pass out paper and pens. Penmanship begins. OOO's and more OOO's. Now iii's and more iii's. then III and mmm. Later kkk and ppp. Movements on paper, movements in space. Recess! Time to run free – take a turn on ropes, rings and merry-go-round.

Back to the classroom. Pass out blank paper and yellow pencils. The teacher forms numbers on the chalkboard. The students copy them on paper. 3+1 (three steps right and one to the left) 2+ 2 (two step forward and two steps back) 4+4( grapevine right and grapevine left). The dance goes on!

The school bus arrives. I find a seat by the window. Buildings and houses pass by –The bus stops outside a Spanish style building. Off the bus—Stroll by desert plants and enter a warm room filled with shelf upon shelf of books. The librarian sits in a chair smiling. We children arrange ourselves on the carpet and watch the librarian open a book. She

begins to read. A whole new world opens up. Animals talk and walk like humans. Fairies flit about. Forests appear. New ideas for the Dance emerge.

Check out books. Walk back to the bus. Pass by parks, over little bridges, curve around a bubbling stream – Stop. Get off the bus. Carry my books up the hill to the welcoming arms of my grandmother. A victrola sits in the living room. I wind it up and put on a record. Music fills the room. My body begins to move. A dance begins.

Now at 85 the dance still goes on. My body gyrates to mid-eastern music. My feet step briskly to Balkan rhythms. I hold hands with friendly people for the last dance of the evening – the *lesnoto*. As the music fades, the people smile, wave and drift off happily to their homes. Silence falls. Sleep tight. We'll dance again another night.



## PUBLICIZING FOLK DANCING WITH MEETUP.COM

As the person responsible for publicity for the Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op, I have made a concerted effort to attract new participants and have had some success. We have about two new people every week now. Of course, only a small percentage stay with us and become regular members, but this is quite an improvement over recent years. Of course we are thrilled when this happens. More than a third of these new people come from Meetup. (Even more learned about us because the Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op website (http:// PasadenaFolkDanceCoop.org) turned up in Google searches. That's a separate story.) Everyone recognizes the need to attract more dancers, and I wanted to share with you one component of our successful efforts. So this article is about making good choices when setting up a Meetup group for vour folk dance organization. I am not a Meetup expert, but I made some mistakes along the way and

Several years ago at a Pasadena Co-op board meeting, **Pat Cross** suggested we try joining Meetup.com. At that time, in our ignorance, the board decided not to do it. I forgot all about Meetup, although in the intervening years, I became responsible for publicity. Early this year one of our other members, Linda Ryan, suggested I try setting up a Meetup group in order to promote our group. Meetup is a social media company that you can use to promote your folk dance group. This for-profit company helps local groups organize and promote themselves. You can use it to try to get new members for your group. Organizing a group costs \$45, but membership for individuals is free.

you can learn from me what to do and not do.

I enter our group in many different online listings, so, when Linda suggested we join Meetup, I quickly set up a Meetup site before dashing off on a short ski vacation. When I returned, to my thrill and horror, I discovered we had 32 Meetup members, all new people! We were not prepared for this. To make things worse, because I had explicitly stated that people did <u>not</u> need to RSVP, our group did not know how many people to expect that night. Was it going to be 2 or 32? I alerted our group, we brought extra food, and hoped for the best. Only two new people showed up. The next week, much to our surprise, we had about eight new people, all beginners, so **Marc Rayman** (who is responsible for teaching) altered our teaching plans on the spot to

accommodate them. Suggestion 1: don't disable the RSVP function; you need to have an idea what to expect.

Suggestion 2: Be prepared. About 72 hours after you set up the Meetup group, an "e-mail blast" will go out to every Meetup member (who shares an "interest topic" with you) within a 50 mile radius of the zip code you give for where your group is located. That e-mail blast will never occur again, so you need to do everything you can to show the new visitors a good time so they will stay with you. If you have a good number of RSVPs, be prepared with good informational signs as to where to park, where to enter the building, and use your best teachers to teach your best beginning dances. You might even persuade some of your regulars to park in less desirable places that first night so the newbies can park in the best locations. Of course, you want everyone to be especially friendly to the newbies.

Suggestion 3: The 15 **topics** for your group are crucial. They can be different from those you use for yourself when you join Meetup. Use *topics* that reach out to a lot of people, so many will receive information about your group during the e-mail blast. About half of the new people we attracted had never heard of folk dancing until they received the Meetup e-mail announcing our group. I had good success by selecting: New in Town, Exercise and Fun, Dance, Night Life, Newly Single, Friends, Fun Times, Social, Make New Friends, Dancing, Dance Lessons, Contra Dance, Folk Dancing, and International Folk Dancing. Bad choices would be things that are too specific, like Romanian folk dance, unless that is the focus of your group. If you want to reach out to those of middle age and beyond (as we do), include topics such as: Retirees, Widows and Widowers, and Seniors. A new topic I especially like is Empty Nester. As you enter your 15 topics, Meetup will suggest additional related topics. You should read these carefully because they can help. After you have finished choosing topics, Meetup will let you know how popular each topic is. Then you can change your topics if you wish.

Suggestion 4: Give strokes. Whenever someone joins at Meetup, you will receive a notice. You should send that new member a welcoming message. I usually sent a message like, "I'm delighted that you joined the Pasadena Folk Dance Co-op. This is a perfect time to join us because we are having a month of beginner-friendly teaching. If you haven't already, see our website at

PasadenaFolkDanceCoop.org. Let me know if you have any questions. I hope to dance with you soon." You can set up your Meetup site so that these welcoming messages are automatically generated. I don't do that, but you can. I look at each new member's Meetup public profile to see if he or she appears particularly promising. I look at their picture, the interests they have, what other groups they have joined, etc. If they look like they will be a good fit for our group, I try to personalize my welcoming message to them. For example, if they are holding a cat in their picture, I would mention that I am a big cat fan. Many of your new Meetup members will join but never show up to dance. It is easy to click to join a Meetup group, but much more difficult to walk into a room full of people you do not know and try to do something new to you. Many of your new members will never show up, but they are more likely to do so if they feel they know you. Marc and I make an effort to arrive early every week and attend beginning teaching, just so we can make sure new people have friendly advocates there in our group who will be helpful but not overwhelming. Of course, other members of our group are especially friendly to new dancers, but we never know who is going to be getting there early.

You should know that Meetup is visited by many, many single people in their 20s and 30s who tend to join Meetup groups, apparently hoping that someone of interest to them will also join the group, so they can exchange messages and perhaps date. These people will visit your Meetup site frequently at first, but will not show up at your group unless they see that someone they like has said they are going to your group. It's a waiting game for them. No amount of friendly messages from you is going to get them to show up and dance. If you are lucky and have your RSVP option enabled, perhaps they might show up if someone interesting to them RSVPs.

Suggestion 5: Create buzz. Get some of the more articulate and computer savvy members of your regular group to join the Meetup group. Remember, it is free to join; it only costs if you create a Meetup group. Ask them to comment to you and to one another about how much fun they had dancing in your group. They should not use it for routine communications but rather to let others see that you have a friendly, welcoming, fun group. People should write things that might interest or attract prospective members. Comments to others in your group with "inside" information are not helpful, and describing your many decades of dance experience may make it seem that your group is only for long-time, serious dancers.. The objective of every single post should

be to say, "Whether you already know how to dance or not, you will have a good time with our group."

Suggestion 6: Know when to quit: After the first two and a half months, the number of new people showing up from your Meetup site may have slowed to a trickle or stopped. Now it is time to decide whether to spend another \$45 (cost may have changed) to renew for another three months. I have heard that some people take their site down, let it rest for a few months, and then restart it, thereby benefiting from the "email blast" a second time. One reason not to do this is if you have some promising looking members in your existing Meetup group who haven't shown up yet, but might do so in the near future. If you take down your Meetup group, you will no longer be able to contact those people and they won't receive updates about what is going on in your group. We continued to have new members join even three full months after I started the Meetup group, so I have continued it.

Suggestion 7: Instead of quitting your old Meetup group, start another Meetup group and benefit from the email blast a second time. For your \$45, you can have three Meetup groups. You don't want to have exactly the same name on the new group, so think of a variation. Perhaps you want to try to attract a different kind of new member, so you can start a group with a slightly different name and change your topics list. For example, for our group, people of middle age would be desirable new members. So I am planning to alter the name of our group slightly and include in its topics list topics to attract an older population.

Suggestion 8: Be aware of geography. Our group is in Pasadena, but I have had people join from Pacific Palisades and from Thousand Oaks. Most people are not as dedicated as Valerie Daley, and would be discouraged by a horrific drive across town on Friday nights. I tell them I would be delighted to have them dance with us, but they might enjoy some other group I suggest (perhaps even your group!) which is closer to where they live. Sometimes I suggest the metro, since our group is near two metro stops.

Meetup is not the only success we have had in attracting new dancers, but it is one that many of you might not know about. International folk dancing has so much to offer but many people don't know about it. I hope that if your group is trying to bring new people in, you will find some of my experiences to be valuable.
