FEDERATION VIRUS RELIEF PROGRAM

The Federation has been contemplating what will happen when clubs try to restart their dance programs after it is safe to do so. Even after government regulations say it is OK to resume our dance activities, we think that attendance will fall short of pre-virus levels. Some will want to isolate for a while longer "to be safe" and some will have fallen out of the habit of going out to dance. However, rent. and other expenses will not have diminished which will put a financial burden on these clubs. In addition. as time comes for insurance renewal, some clubs may not be fully functional or yet to have met. These clubs may be tempted to let their insurance lapse. After much discussion, the Fiscal Committee proposed a relief program which was put into effect by the executive committee. Using un-allocated special project funds, the Federation will underwrite some of a club's expenses for a period of 6 months and will pay the basic level of insurance for each member club. Below is the letter which has gone out to each member club and which fully explains the relief program. We want to see folk dancing flourishing again and hope this program will ease the transition to a full recovery.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE ASSISTANCE


I know that we are all concerned about the effect that this pandemic will have on our ability to continue our enjoyment of folk dancing. We urge all of you to follow government guidelines as to when it will be safe to resume our activities. When that happens and we can restart dancing, we anticipate that clubs may encounter financial stress as rents come due, while attendance has not yet caught up to the previrus levels. Fortunately, the Federation is in a position to provide some financial assistance.

Types and amount of assistance available:

Minimally, the Federation is able to provide assistance at the level of the difference between your club's rent and the income of your regular dance meeting fee for half of your members (based

BLACK DANCE



INTRODUCTION TO BLACK DANCE IN AMERICA

Legally from the 1600's until 1808, illegally for decades afterwards, Black folk were abducted from their Central and Western Africa homes and transported on long, perilous journeys to American shores. They traveled with no suitcases, no backpacks, no wallets full of legal tender. "They came without possessions, but not without culture ... African dance, rooted in a distinctive musical tradition, was one of the most important of the cultural arts carried across the Middle Passage." (Glass, p. 3)

Though dance resonated in the bodies and the hearts of Black newcomers to cotton and rice plantations in America's South, it was not always welcomed by their masters. Owners and overseers at times vigorously suppressed the slaves' urge to dance, in part to minimize opportunities for their coming together where they might plot to escape or plan a rebellion.

Other slave masters permitted dancing on their plantations, sometimes having their chattel perform for themselves or their visitors. Occasionally, at festive seasons, a plantation owner would allow slaves from neighboring plantations to gather together for celebration. Dancing was a foremost activity at such times.

Whether clandestinely on dance-suppressing plantations or openly and joyfully where permitted, dance was a light in the darkness of slavery. "Dance helped ... African Americans retain and reshape their sense of who they were, find emotional release, express individual creativity, and have fun." (Glass, p.13) Slaves came from hundreds of different tribes, each with its own tribal history and customs. The forms of dancing-for-fun and dancing to depict tribal lore or honor tribal heroes or placate tribal gods varied from one African location to another. What helped make it possible for slaves with different roots to work out ways to dance together in their new homes was the fact that much of African dance was built on certain basic characteristics that became the bedrock of Black dance in America.

Basic Characteristics

Total body movement. Unhampered by tight clothing, the African dancer utilized all parts of the body. At the 2005 Camp Hess Kramer, Gary and Jane Diggs taught Kuku, a West African dance. On videotape #1 or the DVD of the Camp, you see the dancers employing legs, feet, arms, hands, torso, and head.

Orientation to the Earth. "The African dancer often bends slightly toward the earth, flattens the feet ... in a wide, solid stance, and flexes the knees." (Glass, p. 16) Postures of working with the land may be simulated.

- **Improvisation.** A dancer was expected to stay within the rhythms and basic structure of a dance, but could feel free to bring his or her own interpretation to its execution.
- **Importance of the Community.** African culture emphasized community in dance, this led to much line and circle dancing. When an individual performed, the observers clapped, sang, offered verbal encouragement. On plantations, little couple dancing occurred.
- **Polyrhythms.** "African music included several rhythms at the same time, and ... dancers could move their shoulders to one beat, hips to another, and knees to yet another." (Glass, p. 21)
- **Percussion.** In Africa the drum was a dominant musical instrument. Black dancers in America made much use of it while augmenting it with foot tapping, and hand clapping.
- **Pantomime.** "Dance movement may ... imitate animal behavior ... reenact human tasks ... express the power of spirits ... portray symbolically the deep, inner natures of men and women." (Glass, p. 21)
- **Something in Hand.** Blacks in America continued the African tradition of holding cloth, sticks, other meaningful or decorative items while dancing.
- **Competition.** Hundreds of years before competitive dancing made its way into American homes by way of television, Black dancers were competing with one another on Southern plantations.

Ultimately Black and American cultures intersected in dancing, and each adapted versions of the other's forms. This did not, however, "change the set of basic African dance characteristics that survived intact and marked most of the dance performed by African Americans." (Glass, p.29)

RING SHOUT

"The Ring Shout is the oldest continuously-practiced African-derived dance in the United States." (Glass, p. 32) As dancers move CCW in a circle, a leader sings short phrases which prompt short responses - sometimes echoes - from the dancers (call-response). There is much repetition by both parties. Usually the leader will be telling an improvised story or teaching a moral lesson. One collection of slave songs has the participants derisively describing the slave owner: "Call me Sunday Christian/Oh, my Lord/Call me Monday devil/Oh, my Lord." (Glass, p. 36)

Rhythm is more important than melody in the Ring Shout, and syncopation is frequently used. Dancers, slightly bent, use shuffling step-close-step movements. Some will turn, bend knees, stamp, shake hips or shoulders. Women may wave handkerchiefs.

Some participants sit on the sidelines for a while - perhaps resting after a period of dancing - and sing, clap hands, slap thighs, beat time with a stick on the wooden floor. Drums will accompany dancers when available.

The dance may go on for an hour or more with increasing intensity and acceleration. Sometimes dancers will reach a state of frenzy. A dancer might be encouraged to leave the circle for a period of calming.

As Blacks began to be converted to Christianity in the early 1800's, the Ring Shout became an instrument of worship. The calls and responses took the form of hymns. A religious phenomenon known as "The Great Awakening" swept the South, and Blacks as well as white folk attended camp meetings where ardent ministers pressed Christian claims. During these meetings Black dancers often engaged in the religious version of the Ring Shout.

There was a price to be paid. Dancing was often not looked on favorably by the proselytizers in charge of the meeting, so on some occasions there could be no crossing or lifting of feet during the performance; ergo, it was not a dance.

After the Civil War, as Blacks established their own churches, the Shout was a frequent component of the Sunday gathering. Benches and pews were sometimes moved to make it possible. When this became impractical, "the rocking and stepping of the Ring Shout survived in individual forms as worshippers stayed in place but danced ... during the religious service." (Glass, p. 52)

The Ring Shout is recognized as having a significant influence on the development of the Black dances that appeared later. The next issue of Scene will look at some of these dances.

DANCERS SPEAK

ZIPPITY DOO DAH, ZIPPITY ZOOM DANCE

Kudos to the local dance leaders, Wen-Li Chiang, Sherry Cochran, Lee Otterholt and the San Diego Folk Dance Center executive committee, who organize weekly dance sessions online! You are providing opportunities for us folk dancers to make lemonade out of the Covid lemon.

Beaming faces, sometimes perplexed by wavering internet transmission and garbled audio output, greet us when we log in for a joyful evening of dance.

Maybe you doubt the power of zoom dancing to connect our dance community. Were you following an online leader and got frustrated by the steps being out of sync with the song? Or irritated when the leader's feet disappeared behind a table? Perhaps you looked at thumbnails of people dancing alone between stove & refrigerator and thought, "That looks ridiculous!" You're not the only Zoomer who left a session feeling annoyed. Just like we've all learned to live more comfortably with the menace of Covid, Zoom leaders and techies have mastered techniques for making Zoom dancing flow more smoothly. The result is varied dance sessions with joyful music, challenging step patterns, familiar dances, opportunity to catch up with friends' lives.

It's helpful to refocus perception from viewing individuals doing a circle dance alone in separate compartments, to feeling your own response while dancing. Tense shoulders relax (and no one is hanging onto you or squeezing your hand). A smile crosses your face as you forget, then remember, a step you well know. Beloved songs echo in your ear. Memories of doing a dance at a specific party crowd out thoughts of chores. Your muscles come alive. Knees feel springier, your steps have a bounce. You think of dances you want to be doing and rush to the keyboard to make a request. After a few sessions vou become curious. When was that dance introduced to the recreational folk dance community? By which leader? What is the meaning of the lyrics? Which instrument contributes that deep sound? What are the "counts" for that Bulgarian dance your feet know, but your brain doesn't? Who all is dancing in the Zoom room that session? Where do they live? Suddenly you recognize a dancer on the screen that you met a dozen years ago on a trip to Romania! Later you hear the voice of the dancer from your group who recently moved to Florida.

That's the "lemonade" of Zoom dancing. You can meet up with folks in Boston, North Carolina and Sweden who all dance to the music you cherish. The next night you can dance with acquaintances in California and welcome the new person who zooms in. You realize: "Hey, I'm part of this community and glad of it! When the spotlight shines onto each participant in turn, you'll find yourself waving vigorously. When the spotlight turns onto you, you'll smile, wave and glide joyfully across your kitchen. More lemonade: better night of sleep with sweet dreams!

Process for applying for assistance:

Write a brief message requesting this assistance. Be sure to include the amount of your monthly rent and your regular dance meeting fee. We already have the number of your members that you provided last fall, so you don't have to include that. If your club has additional financial hardship beyond this amount, please describe it as well. Depending on funds available, the Federation will make its best effort to provide additional support so that all clubs can resume a flourishing dance experience. Applications will be screened by the finance committee.

INSURANCE
