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# **CHOREOGEOGRAPHY: POLAND**

Ed.s Note: The following article was written by the late Richard Duree, a former member of the Scene committee; and appeared in the March, 2005 issue. It is now available in the Federation web-site under 'Articles', along with many other well-written and interesting folklore items.

Poland's dance is an interesting mix of highly-developed national dances and earthy village dances, with a unique mixture of regional styles, costume, and music. As much as any ethnic dance of Europe, the Poles dance with the entire body, including arms and head, with soft, effortless movements contrasting sharply to erect, vigorous, powerful ones. It's an interesting body of dance, well worth a close Choreogeographic study.

The country is both blessed and cursed by its location and topography, an easily crossed area devoid of natural obstacles to the many invaders who have trampled it through the centuries as they sought to destroy one another. To the south, the rugged, lovely Tatra Mountains form an impressive boundary with Slovakia and the former Austro-Hungarian Empire. On the north, the Baltic Sea is a major outlet to the world through its many ports.

From the east and west the powerful military cultures of the Ukrainians and Germans came to shed each other's and Polish blood. Anyone with even a smattering of European history knows of the country's troubled past. Polish military history is filled with legends of extraordinary heroism and the tradition of brilliant military horsemanship. Indeed, the horse plays an important role in Polish folklore, as we shall see.

But to the dance . . .

Men's boots are soft, allowing both great flexibility of technique and protection for strong heel-beats, seemingly a requirement for booted dancers everywhere. Women's boots are frequently laced tight, though the popular "folk dance" style boot is found everywhere. Costumes, as in every other country, are very local and readily identify the wearer's hometown. Polish folk costumes are among the most recognizable in Europe and, in the case of Novy Sącz, among the most elaborate.

There are five national dances, all highly influenced by professional dance masters. These are "Pan Poland" and exist outside the village dance repertoire. We are most familiar with these national dances, often to the point of ignoring the village dances altogether.

The dances are perhaps most readily approached in order of tempo from slowest to quickest: Polonaise, Kujawiak, Mazur, Krakowiak, and Oberek. Note that the polka is not one of them, though it is danced throughout the country.

Polonaise – To many Poles, this is the most important dance of all and, perhaps because of Chopin's music, it is possibly the most well-known. It opens every ball, led by the guest of honor or the ranking person present, its elegant 3/2 rhythm setting the mood for the



evening's festivities. We are informed that the Polonaise was the dance in which all sorts of clandestine arrangements were made. (Maybe that's why it was so important.) Elegance and restraint are the major characteristics, almost pompous in demeanor with bows and curtseys and flirtatious acknowledgments, weaving graceful figures across the floor not unlike the 16th and 17th Century ball



dances from which it descended.

Kujawiak – The only dance which attempts to tell a story, the kujawiak (koo YA vee yak) originated in the impoverished Kujawy region of north central Poland. Its swampy soils were unable to produce abundant crops and its

dance reflects the poverty in the sad, lovely strains of its music and in heavy, graceful gestures, a unique character of restrained beauty and free-flowing movement across the floor.

**Mazur** – The ultimate court dance of old Poland, the Mazur was danced at court in elaborate court dress and brilliant military uniforms by young, fit, energetic ladies and gentlemen. Named for the

Mazowsce region in which Warsaw is located, the Mazur perhaps more than any other dance reflects the tradition of horsemanship. The dancer literally flies across the floor in steps and figures designed to mimic the horse and propel one forward in graceful, gliding leaps as one might gallop unhindered across the open landscape.



Listen to this the next time you hear the Mazur: the 3/4 music is accented on the second beat; it's subtle, but it's there and that's why it is so difficult to waltz to what appears to be a waltz rhythm. The reason: tradition has it that the rhythm was influenced by the gait of a galloping horse which begins with a step on one or the other rear hooves (count 1), then the opposite rear hoof and its diagonal front hoof land together (count 2), and the remaining front hoof completes the cycle (count 3), thus the heavier



accent on the second beat. Isn't folklore wonderful?

Krakowiak – Obviously from the Krakow region of south-central Poland, near the foot of the mighty Tatra mountains, the Krakowiak is the only national dance in 2/4 rhythm. The heel-beats are there, as is the rapid, lateral movement, but now comes a sudden

stop, followed by vigorous figures performed in place, as though the horseman came upon the impassable mountains.

Oberek – The fastest and most demanding of the

national dances. Oberek means "spinning," and so it does. Its 3/4 rhythm is danced in a unique syncopation, counted "1&2-3," a kind of "quickslower-slow" rhvthm which gives the dance a powerful, driving character. Couples spin clockwise in a unique position, the lady on the man's right and holding his upper arm with her left hand as he executes leg sweeps from a deep



plie or leaps high in the air at the end of a spin, or tosses his partner high in the air over his shoulder. A great dance for showing off. It frequently appears as a break in the melancholy Kujawiak, a study in contrasts.

Those, academically speaking, are the five national dances of Poland. There are more, however - many more. Among the most well-known and interesting are the dances of the Gorali, mountain dwellers of southern Poland's Tatra mountains, where kierpceclad feet move with unbelievable speed and the dancers move laterally very little. Muscles developed from a lifetime of walking the steeply-sloped land lend an easy power and grace to the mountaineer's dances, alternating deep knee-bends with exhilarating leaps. The *chupaga* (mountaineer's axe) appears prominently in men's dances and couple dances resemble nothing so much as the aggressive courtship of the eagle. No horses depicted here! Poland is thus one of the most demonstrable examples of the effects of topography, history, and livelihood in the way its people live - and dance.

# POLISH DANCE MUSIC

#### CLASSICAL MUSIC BASED ON POLISH FOLKDANCES

In Russia a **krakowiak** was featured in Mikhail Glinka's *A Life for the Tsar* (1836) and, ever since, became an identifiable symbol of Poles and Polish culture in the Russian Empire, especially due to the *rogatywka* hat. The first printed Krakowiak appeared in Franciszek Mirecki's album for the piano, "Krakowiaks Offered to the Women of Poland" (Warsaw, 1816).

Frédéric Chopin produced a bravura concert krakowiak in his Grand Rondeau de Concert, *Rondo à la Krakowiak in F major* for piano and orchestra (Op. 14, 1828). The last movement of his first piano concerto also draws heavily on the dance.

The **polonaise** is one of the most ancient Polish dances representing Polish cultural dance tradition. Polonaise dance influenced European ballrooms, folk music and European classical music. The polonaise has a rhythm quite close to that of the Swedish semiquaver or sixteenth-note *polska*, and the two dances share a common origin. Polska dance was introduced to Sweden during the period of the Vasa dynasty.

The notation alla polacca (Italian: polacca means "polonaise") on a musical score indicates that the piece should be played with the rhythm and character of a polonaise. For example, the third movement of Beethoven's Triple Concerto op. 56, marked "Rondo alla polacca," and the finale of Chopin's Variations on Là ci darem la mano both feature this notation, as does the fourth movement from Beethoven's Serenade in D major, Op. 8.

Frédéric Chopin's polonaises are generally the best known of all polonaises in classical music. Other composers who wrote polonaises or pieces in polonaise rhythm include Johann Sebastian Bach, Georg Philipp Telemann, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Ludwig van Beethoven, Karol Kurpiński, Józef Elsner, Maria Agata Szymanowska, Henryk Wieniawski, Franz Schubert, Carl Maria von Weber, Robert Schumann, Franz Liszt, Johann Kaspar Mertz, Moritz Moszkowski, Modest Mussorgsky, Nicolai Rimsky-Korsakov, Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky and Alexander Scriabin.

Another more recent prolific polonaise composer was the American Edward Alexander MacDowell.

John Philip Sousa wrote the *Presidential Polonaise*, intended to keep visitors moving briskly through the White House receiving line. Sousa wrote it in 1886 after a suggestion from President Chester A. Arthur.

Tchaikovsky's opera *Eugene Onegin*, an adaption of Alexander Pushkin's novel in poetry verse, includes a famous polonaise.

The **mazurka** (Polish: *mazurek*) is a Polish musical form based on stylized folk dances in triple meter, usually at a lively tempo, with character defined mostly by the prominent mazur's "strong accents unsystematically placed on the second or third beat". The mazurka, alongside the polka dance, became popular at the ballrooms and salons of Europe in the 19th century, particularly through the notable works by Frédéric Chopin.

The *mazurka* is always found to have either a triplet, trill, dotted eighth note (quaver) pair, or an ordinary eighth note pair before two quarter notes (crotchets). In the 19th century, the form became popular in many ballrooms in different parts of Europe.

Several classical composers have written mazurkas, with the best known being the 59 composed by Frédéric Chopin for solo piano. The stylistic and musical characteristics of Chopin's mazurkas differ from the traditional variety because Chopin in effect created a completely separate and new genre of mazurka all his own. For example, he used classical techniques in his mazurkas, including counterpoint and fugue. By including more chromaticism and harmony in the mazurkas, he made them more technically interesting than the traditional dances. Chopin also tried to compose his mazurkas in such a way that they could not be used for dancing, so as to distance them from the original form.

However, while Chopin changed some aspects of the original mazurka, he maintained others. His mazurkas, like the traditional dances, contain a great deal of repetition: repetition of certain measures or groups of measures; of entire sections; and of an initial theme. The rhythm of his mazurkas also remains very similar to that of earlier mazurkas. However, Chopin also incorporated the rhythmic elements of the two other Polish forms mentioned above, the *kujawiak* and *oberek*; his mazurkas usually feature rhythms from more than one of these three forms (*mazurek*, *kujawiak*, and *oberek*). This use of rhythm suggests that Chopin tried to create a genre that had ties to the original form, but was still something new and different.

Trying to decide how to tune up your body for the festival? Evidence for the benefits of a little high intensity exercise continues to accumulate. Writing in the Washington Post column December 9, 2022 Gretchen Reynolds reported that a recent study

found even 3 minutes of vigorous exercise daily is associated with lower mortality. # **COSTUME CORNER**

### Łowicz, Poland

To me, the most gorgeous of all Polish women's costumes is that from Łowicz, just west of Warsaw. (The weird crossed Ł is said like our W—so the name is pronounced roughly *Wovich*.) Orange, orange, delicious orange! (*Photo 1*) Skirt, apron, and cape are all woven from very fine, hard-spun wool dyed some shade of



bright orange, alternating with thinner stripes of green, blue, maroon, and occasionally black, white, or pink, all packed very tightly onto a heavy warp to make a nice warm fabric. For this area is quite cold in winter. But beware: the brightly colored weft is so tightly packed that if the plain tan warp hidden beneath ever breaks somewhere, a great puff of weft springs loose!

The cape, resplendent in its glory (Photo 2), is not otherwise ornamented except with a narrow tie, woven of the same yarns in a more intricate pattern, to fasten it around one's neck. The skirt and apron used to be similarly plain along the bottom, but more recently they have often acquired a black felt strip embellished with bright appliqué flowers (Photo 3); and the wool now also tends to revel in a darker, more intensely orange dye (**Photo 4**).

Underneath the orange shell, the woman wears a long-sleeved cotton blouse or chemise, usually plain except for a ruffled lace collar and a puff of lace at the wrists. It is topped by a tight sleeveless vest, plain or fancy, that fastens up the front, plus the long-traditional multi-strand necklace of solid red or coral beads (*Photo 5*). Around her head she might wrap a soft, fine scarf of plaid or printed wool (*Photo 6*), or if she is about to be married, a tall flowered headdress. And don't forget the high, black, cube-heeled boots, laced up the front with bright blue or red laces!

# RECENT EVENTS

#### **NEVENKA CONCERT**

"Memories of Kindness" -- a concert in celebration of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the date when the Bulgarian Jews were saved from being shipped to death camps by the Bulgarian people took place on March 25 at the Glorya Kaufman Performing Arts Center. Performing artists included: Nevenka accompanied by Bill Cope, Pat MacSwyney, Jake Bluenote, Simeon Pillich; the Yuval Ron Ensemble; and Tzvetanka Varimezova and Ivan Varimezov. Musicians in the Yuval Ron Ensemble are Yuval Ron, Jamie Paapish, Norik Manoukian and Elinor Sitrish.

Boyko Hristov, the Bulgarian Consul in Los Angeles, introduced the artists and noted that the Varimezovis and their music have been missed in SoCal since their return to Bulgaria. Trudy Israel provided historical context for the celebration. She explained that the Jews in Bulgaria were Sephardic Jews who had been expelled from Spain in 1492, and had become well integrated into Bulgarian society. March 10 is celebrated as the Day of Salvation, when King Boris halted the deportation of Bulgaria's Jews. Boris has a somewhat mixed record, and was not mentioned in this concert, which recognized the kindness of the Bulgarian people and the Bulgarian Orthodox Church.

Nevenka, joined by Tzvetanka Varimezova, performed Bulgarian and Sephardic songs from their repertoire with consummate style and beauty. The Yuval Ron Ensemble presented several Sephardic songs, sung dramatically by Elinor Sitris. Yuval Ron introduced a piece that he wrote based on the Buddhist mantra of compassion, which is recorded on his album "Four Divine States of Mind." Nevenka returned to the stage, followed by the Yuval Ron Ensemble. Ivan Varimezov, playing gaida, joined the Ensemble—a surprisingly successful merger. The concert ended with Yuval Ron leading a chant based on the words Shalom - Salam - Mir ("peace" in Hebrew, Arabic, and Russian/Ukrainian).

When I started folk dancing, the idea was that learning about other cultures was a path to world peace and understanding. This turned out to be a failure as far as avoiding war, but it led to a lot of wonderful music and dance and theater.

After a number of visits and requests for volunteers we were introduced to the role of extras in their production. Our bit was limited to one day, and we had to be COVID tested the night before, and again on the Thursday morning before entering the church hall our usual venue.

I was expecting a lot of waiting time during the whole day thinking what to bring to read. Not so! We were called into the set space many times to dance short takes and retakes with their three actors—three scenes, but shot again from different angles, each reshot three to five times. We were background dancers to the closeups of the actors.

The three actors—a young woman who is a regular attendee at our dances, an older woman playing dance mistress, an older man playing the buffoon and butt of her exhortations; they had only brief speaking interactions. We were called upon to dance or fake, then released many times from 11 to 5:30. No need for other pastimes. The production provided lunch and an hour break to enjoy it. Snacks were available too.

It was amazing how much time was spent on shooting and reshooting for so little content. The whole day was spent on basically three minimal interactions among the three principal actors. Not enough to give us an idea where it was going nor where it came from. I was pleased to have participated as an extra in this, but it was a once in a lifetime experience for me, never before nor again.

At least we did get to dance! One-third of Alunelul - 24 times.
