PRESIDENT'S COLUMN FOR DEC./JAN SCENE

Bring on the glitter, glamour, twinkly lights and candles! Wrap presents, spin a dreidel, bake ginger cookies, attend the Nutcracker, sing traditional refrains. The atmosphere is jubilant. Merriment prevails. Cheery greetings and friendly toasts echo through holiday gatherings. And then, it's over.

Anytime of the year, but especially during the dark days of winter, we can walk into our weekly dance clubs feeling gray and uninspired. Yes, the music and the exercise lift our spirits, but sometimes it seems gloom has gone viral and no one feels hopeful, energized nor excited to be there. But you are there in the dance room, not home in bed with a book. What to do to bring joy into the room? All suggestions are welcome! Send your solutions for turning around a plodding dance experience into a satisfying afternoon or evening to: info@socal.org. In the meantime, here are two ideas from psychologists who write about personal and group dynamics: Creative and caring acts

Delete the planned playlist and ask each dancer which folk dance has special significance in their memory. (Marta Hullihen would be calling out "Joc de Leagane" because she danced that after the birth of her son.) Play the significant dances instead of recently taught, etc. and let folks tell why specific dances are meaningful to them.

Think of dance friends who are MIA because they moved out of the area. Now recall one of the dances associated with each missing friend. Put those on the playlists, make a brief video clip of the group dancing and send it along with your greeting. At Narodni we've been missing Ed and Pauline Klak, who loved to sing "Joj Rado, Joj Radmila" as they danced (ditto Dzevad Belčic. We've missed Karen and Dzevad's annual visits to SoCal since Covid impacted travel in 2020). For Karen we would dance Jaap's "Kirčo Na Čardak Sedeše."

COSTUME CORNER

Of Ducktails and Rib-Cages

In discussing the costumes of Matyó women in northern Hungary last month, I mentioned the little ducktail that they traditionally contrive at the back of their waist-length jackets, just below a tight, wide band of contrasting color encircling the lower ribcage. Today the band is a wide, flowery, woven tape below which springs a thick ruffle that extends just below the waist, finishing off the bottom of the cotton jacket all the way around (*Photo 1*). But a century ago, when jackets were made of much more expensive brocade (Photo 2), the rib band is of black velvet and the short section below the waist is just wavy—yet it has been cleverly cut with gores to stick out, and has actually been "boned" in back with a wire sewn inside so as to protrude in a quite pronounced ducktail.



I was fascinated by this ducktail when I purchased the old orange Matyó jacket in Mezőkövesd in 1979, because I already owned another jacket with a gored ducktail (*Photo 3*)—this one made in 1964 to fit me by Brasnik, a maker of traditional Ukrainian costumes in New York City. This ducktail was not boned, but it was cut in the same way as the Hungarian one, so that the soft material would stick out in back on its own. I long wondered at the connection between these costumes.

My sister found it for me last spring, traveling in the northwest corner of Romania on a Sunday, when women in Central Europe traditionally go to church dressed up in their local costume (*Photo 4*). At least some of the local people are Hungarian-speakers. The jackets of the younger women are constructed, like my antique orange Hungarian one, with a wide black band around the lower ribcage above a short, full skirt, but no ducktail. An older woman that she photographed in the same village, however, wears a costume sewn entirely from flowered cotton, like my southwestern Ukrainian one, but with the Hungarian-type ribcage band (*Cover*). So we have ducktails in SW Ukraine, heavy ribcage bands in NW Romania, and both in NE Hungary—three different countries today. It remains only for someone to determine who got which from whom!

DANCERS SPEAK

Ed's Note: Some years ago Lou Pechi wrote a series of articles for Folk Dance Scene under the heading "Dancing with Two Left Feet". These were well-received and we thought it was time to re-print them. Here is one:

TENNIS SHOES

I was wondering if the shoes you wear help your dancing.

I remember years ago, when I just started folk dancing, I wore clunky sneakers. No one called them sneakers then. They were tennis shoes,



specifically designed for tennis and obviously not for folk dancing. They made me stumble and trip on the simple steps the teacher demonstrated. I struggled with the huge and heavy footgear, completely convinced the shoes were what kept me from doing the right steps. Several people wearing some funny pointed leather shoes, glided through the steps like smooth skaters. Not only did they do the steps without any effort, they even added a few of their own little twists and decorations to the steps.

I thought; it must be the shoes.

I started to inquire what these wonderful shoes were and where they bought them. They indicated that these marvels of dancing were called *Opanke* and were quite common not only in Yugoslavia, but in many Balkan countries. At that time, you could only get them in their native country. Being a poor engineer, just barely out of college, a trip to Europe was way beyond my reach.

I enviously watched the "hot-shots" doing their high kicks and small rapid steps with my trying to follow in my clunky tennis shoes. Someday, I thought, when I don the *Opanke*, I will be able to join them without

embarrassing myself.

Years later, that marvelous day approached. We managed to save enough for a family trip to Europe, which included a swing through Yugoslavia and Greece. In the main market in Zagreb, I finally purchased a pair of Croatian *Opanke*. After our trip, I showed up at our folkdance group with my shiny new purchase on my feet. The music started to play, I joined the "hot-shot" line, and marvel of all marvels, I, not missing a beat, was able to dance with them.

It had to be the shoes!

They accepted me and for years, while wearing the *Opanke*, I was a member of this elite group.

Over the years, my feet started to hurt. Plantar fasciitis forced me into a pair of clunky Mephisto shoes with thick soles and stiff orthotics in them. As I changed the shoes, my dancing degraded. I was not able to move my feet fast enough to catch the quick Serbian steps. Râčenicas became an exercise in running after a fast moving train, and any dance that required steps longer than half a foot became difficult to do.

Looking in the mirror in our dance class, I smiled at myself, dancing as I did years ago in those clunky tennis shoes.

However, over these years my enthusiasm never waned. I cannot do what I used to do, but whatever I do, I do it with the same gusto.

Keep dancing, whichever way you can.

How else could we perform impromptu acts of caring at folk dance sessions? How could we become playfully creative?

I would call on my teacher background and play the "Small Change" game. Start with one dance, for example the first folk dance that the most experienced dancer in the room can remember learning. When that dance ends, choose the next one that has a characteristic that matches the first dance, but also has a different element. So, if you danced the Croatian Hopa Hopa with lots of step hops first, you might dance Rumunsko Kolo next because it has step hops but travels counter clockwise, or a Schottiche that has step hops, but is a couple dance rather than a circle

dance. With a dozen active brains each seeking common and different elements to link dances a surprising playlist will emerge. We dancers will be so engaged thinking about dance characteristics and remembering how to do seldom played dances that disengagement and depression will evaporate.

If not, maybe we had all go to bed earlier the night before a dance event. Note to self: sleep in on Saturday February 15 so I have energy to dance at the Lunar New Year Festival sponsored by the Cerritos Folk Dancers. CU there!


